#### **Parish Report Form**

This year, the Diocesan Council has agreed to change the way parishes submit their reports. Modeled after the form used by the Diocese of the West, we now have a uniform Parish Report Form. Simply download it from the Assembly web page at <a href="http://domoca.org/assembly.html">http://domoca.org/assembly.html</a>, fill it out on your computer, and email it to Philip Sokolov at <a href="mailto:chancery@domoca.org">chancery@domoca.org</a>. It is hoped this will streamline the process, making it clearer and easier for everyone at every stage.

One additional benefit of this form is that it allows us to eliminate the annual Census that was formerly collected separately in January. The census numbers reported on the new report form will be the ones used for the 2014 assessments. The new forms will be issued in preparation for all future assemblies so the time period will, in the future reflect a one-year period. This form does not replace the responsibility of submitting your annual meeting minutes and election material for episcopal approval.

The deadline for this form is Wednesday, September 25.

The composition of delegates from each parish is made up of the assigned priests and deacons, *ex officio*, and an equal number of lay delegates. One lay delegate is allowed from each parish not having an assigned priest. Lay delegates are elected by a parish meeting or parish council (consult parish bylaws). Others may attend as observers. #### 51ST ASSEMBLY OF THE DIOCESE OF THE MIDWEST

# Broadview Heights, Ohio 12 November 2012

#### PLENARY SESSION I

#### I. OPENING.

The Assembly opened with the Invocation of the Holy Spirit and prayer at 9:22 a.m., after which His Eminence, Archbishop Nikon called the Assembly to order.

#### II. CREDENTIALS.

One Archbishop, 60 clergy delegates, 59 lay delegates, and 12 observers, for a total of 132 participants.

#### III. INTRODUCTORY REMARKS, APPOINTMENTS.

After introductory remarks, Archbishop Nikon turned the podium over to Archpriest John Zdinak, Chancellor, who recommended minor revisions to the agenda, adding that the Diocesan Council had requested that he chair the meeting. He moved, on behalf of the Diocesan Council, that Archpriests John Matusiak and Mark Hodges and Mrs. Ann Marie Mecera serve as the secretariat, and that Archpriest John Adamcio, Priest Nicholas Finley, and Ms. Kitty Mabus serve on the nominating committee. [Since Ms. Mabus was in hospital, Archpriest Thomas Mueller was asked to take her her place.] He further moved that Archpriest Christopher Wojcik, Priest Stephen Hrycyniak and Doris Weissman serve on the resolutions committee. All deacons in attendance will serve as tellers.

#### IV. DEANERY REPORTS.

The reports of the Chicago, Cleveland, Columbus, and Minneapolis deaneries were accepted as presented. Archpriest Timothy Sawchak, Dean of the Kansas City Deanery, added to his report that Deacon Joel Wilson, who is attached to Saint Thomas Church, Springfield, MO, is planting a mission in Rolla, MO.

Archpriest Andrew Yavornitzky, Dean of the Michigan Deanery, added to his report that His Grace, Bishop Mark of Baltimore, presided at the consecration of Saint Mark Church, Rochester, MI. He also added that the faithful of Saints Peter and Paul Cathedral, Detroit, continue to make every effort to maintain an active presence, and that they will be hosting their second annual Thanksgiving dinner for neighborhood residents. They also are working closely with Orthodox Outreach Detroit-FOCUS.

#### V. MONASTERY REPORTS.

The reports of Saint John Monastery, Hiram, OH, and the Presentation of the Virgin Mary Monastery, Marshfield, MO, were accepted as presented.

#### VI. DIACONAL VOCATIONS PROGRAM REPORT.

The report was accepted as presented, with no additions.

#### VII. PARISH HEALTH FACILITATOR REPORT.

Mr. Joseph Kormos, Parish Health Facilitator, stated that he had nothing to add to his written report, but thanked everyone for the opportunity to head the ministry for the past six years. Participants offered their applause.

#### VIII. METROPOLITAN COUNCIL REPRESENATIVES' REPORT.

The report stands as presented, with no additions.

#### IX. TREASURER'S AND AUDITORS' REPORTS.

Father Hrycyniak and Mr. Sam D'Fantis, Finance Committee members, reviewed the reports in the absence of Mr. Robert Koncel, Treasurer.

In response to enquires concerning the deficit and salary increases, Mr. D'Fantis stated that the latter were included in response to the request of His Grace, Bishop Matthias, adding that the Finance Committee is willing to entertain motions to modify the budget. Father Zdinak added that 2011 overages were incurred as a result of unbudgeted expenses related to the Bishop's consecration and salary and unforseen expenses with regard to maintenance and repairs at the Diocesan Center. He affirmed that the 2013 budget is balanced and based on the most recent census numbers. Upon motion by Mrs. Linda Livosky, seconded by Matushka Gina Mueller, it was decided to table discussion on the budget until the afternoon session. Motion carred with 51 in favor, 46 against.

The Auditors' Report was accepted as presented *upon motion by Archpriest Nicholas Wyslutsky, seconded by Mr. Dennis Garlick.* 

#### X. CHANCELLOR'S REPORT AND SUBSEQUENT DISCUSSION.

Father Zdinak offered a comprehensive and objective report/timeline with regard to issues related to Bishop Matthias.

- **A.** On 24 August 2012, a complaint alleging sexual misconduct on the part of Bishop Matthias was sent to the Holy Synod of Bishops.
- **B.** Concurrently, a copy of the complaint was sent to Father Zdinak and Archpriest John Jillions, as chancellors of the Diocese of the Midwest and the Orthodox Church in America respectively.
- C. The matter was immediately referred to the Holy Synod, inasmuch as it involved a hierarch. The Holy Synod acted in accordance with the OCA Policy and Procedures and placed Bishop Matthias on administrative leave.
- D. Because at the time most bishops had been assigned to oversee other dioceses, in addition to their own, the Holy

- Synod appointed Father Zdinak to serve as Administrator of the Diocese of the Midwest.
- **E.** From the beginning, Bishop Matthias abided by, and continues to abide by, the guidelines fully. He was not to make any decisions. He was permitted to receive the Eucharist at Chicago's Holy Trinity Cathedral and Christ the Savior Church and Saint Gregory of Nyssa Church, Columbus, OH.
- **F.** The Diocese was neither involved in the adjudication and investigation process, nor in any other aspect of the case, until Friday, 9 November 2012, at which time His Eminence, Archbishop Tikhon informed Father Zdinak that letters from the Holy Synod and Bishop Matthias would be released on Saturday, 10 November.
- G. Father Zdinak received numerous enquiries after the release of the aforementioned letters. He noted that he wanted to make it "clear" that internet reports alleging that he had verified certain statements were not true, that he "had not verified anything," and that he had never called for Bishop Matthias to resign publicly. The final decision is exclusively the prerogative of the Holy Synod. Consequently, no "resolution" will be permitted from the assembly.
- **H.** Father Zdinak thanked Archbishop Nikon for chairing the 51st Assembly. He further thanked Archbriest John Jillions for his presence, and invited him to comment.

Father Jillions offered comments and observations.

- I. While there is a lot of pain being experienced, a lot of life is evident in diocesan parishes. And while members of the Diocesan Council expressed differences of opinion at their meeting on the eve of the assembly, Father Jillions stated that he was struck "by the civility [and] the sincere pastoral Christian approach to the issues."
- **J.** He confirmed that the complaint had been received on 24 August 2012. Upon receipt of the complaint, and in line with normal procedures, it was assessed as quickly as possible. A response team was appointed to conduct a formal enquiry into the allegations.
- **K.** Father Jillions and a licensed psychologist met with Bishop Matthias on 26 August. A report of the meeting was sent to the Office of Review of Sexual Allegations. On that basis, a three-member response team was established. This "took some time," inasmuch as it was crucial that the three response team members bore no conflicts of interest, real or perceived, in the matter.
- L. Their report was given to the members of the Lesser Synod of Bishops, who read the team's findings and recommendations and shared them with the Holy Synod, which issued the aforementioned letter, released on Saturday, 10 November.

Archbishop Nikon confirmed the aforementioned information offered by Fathers Zdinak and Jillions. In addition, he noted that

- **M.** upon receipt of the initial allegations, the Holy Synod affirmed that established policies must be followed, as in any other situation. Policies were followed "to the letter," with "no favoritism [and] no change in the policies."
- N. the members of the Holy Synod agreed that it was necessary to send a message to the Diocese of the Midwest, especially since they acknowledged that Bishop Matthias was "hurting," as was the diocese.
- O. the negative reaction to the letter came as a surprise, since it clearly outlined the policies.
- **P.** Bishop Matthias accepted the decision of the Holy Synod and expressed his willingness to participate in an extended program, employed by the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of America, aimed at offering a healthy perception acceptable and unacceptable boundaries.
- **Q.** no further decisions have been made by the Holy Synod; further decisions hinge on the outcome of the aforementioned program. Consequently, the matter has yet to be fully resolved for Bishop Matthias, the Holy Synod, or the diocese.
- **R.** while the members of the Holy Synod are well aware of what appears on the internet, it would be best for those who have "something to say to the diocesan leaders to say it directly."
- **S.** while we as Church have endured crises for the past decade, we have not stopped being the Church, and the diocese cannot stop being the Church.

Delegates were invited to share their views on the aforementioned issues. Comments, heard through the conclusion of the morning session and into the afternoon session, appear as an Addendum to these minutes and are made a part thereof.

#### PLENARY SESSION II

#### XI. OPENING.

After a break for lunch, the session opened at 1:10 p.m.

#### XII. CREDENTIALS.

One Archbishop, 62 clergy delegates, 55 lay delegates, and 13 observers, for a total of 131 participants.

#### XIII. CONTINUATION OF DISCUSSION.

Father Zdinak continued to field comments from the floor. At the conclusion of the discussion, he stated that Archbishop Nikon and Father Jillions had heard everything that had been shared and will take what they have experienced into consideration in further actions.

#### XIV. 2013 BUDGET.

Upon motion by Mr. D'Fantis, seconded by Archpriest James Dank, discussion of the 2013 budget was reopened.

After moderate discussion concerning a proposed salary increase for Bishop Matthias, in light of future uncertainties, Father Christopher Wojcik, seconded by Priest William John Neumann, moved to remove the increase from the budget. Motion carried.

After additional discussion, Father Zdinak, seconded by Priest Elijah Mueller, moved to adopt the budget as amended. Motion carried.

Father Hrycyniak, seconded by Father Dank, further moved to grant authority to the Diocesan Council to adjust items in the budget for 2013 alone in light of the fact that Bishop Matthias' future status is unknown at this time. Motion carried.

#### XV. ELECTIONS.

Priest Nicholas Finley was elected clergy representative to the Metropolitan Council. Priest Elijah Mueller will serve as alternate

Elected as lay members of the Diocesan Council were Messers. Michael Herzak and Dennis Garlick and Mrs. Mecera. Mrs. Doris Wiseman will serve as alternate.

Mr. Frank Tkacz was elected to serve as auditor by acclamation.

#### XVI. OTHER BUSINESS.

- A. Father Zdinak reported that, in June 2012, it was learned that the Diocese of the Midwest was to receive a rebate from the 16th All-American Council, held in October/November 2011. Consideration had been given to using the rebate to fund a seminary scholarship fund in memory of His Eminence, the late Archbishop Job. Upon learning that the 17th All-American Council would convene, he had to make an executive decision, namely that the Diocese of the Midwest would assess parishes for the 17th All-American Council while still creating the aforementioned scholarship fund. Upon motion by Father Zdinak, seconded by Father Finley, it was decided to create the seminary scholarship fund.
- **B.** A resolution calling for a no confidence vote in Bishop Matthias was ruled out of order.
- C. A resolution calling for a no confidence vote in the Holy Synod of Bishops was ruled out of order.
- **D.** In response to a lengthy discussion on adopting an alternative to the current per capita assessment, by which parishes would be asked to remit 12% of their unrestricted income, Mr. Michael Herzak, Sr. moved, seconded by Father Hrycyniak, that the Diocesan Council establish a committee to discern firm standards and guildelines and ways to gather information on the financial support of the diocese and report their findings at the 2013 Diocesan Assembly, at which time action with regard to implementation, may be taken. Motion carried.
- **E.** Mrs. Trudy Ellmore, who serves as webmaster of the diocesan web site, was introduced and thanked for her good work on behalf of all.
- **F.** On behalf of all participants, Father Zdinak offered gratitude to Archpriest John Memorich and the faithful of Archangel Michael Church for their gracious hospitality in hosting the Assembly.

#### XVII. ADJOURNMENT AND INSTALLATION.

There being no further business, and upon motion by Father Adamcio, seconded by Archpriest Joseph Gibson, the Assembly adjourned at 3:30 p.m. with a Service of Thanksgiving and the installation of elected officers.

### MEETING OF THE DIOCESAN COUNCIL OF THE DIOCESE OF THE MIDWEST

# Broadview Heights, Ohio 11 November 2012

#### I. OPENING.

The meeting opened with the singing of "O Heavenly King" led by His Eminence, Archbishop Nikon, at 7:56 p.m.

#### II. ATTENDANCE.

Present were Archbishop Nikon; Archpriests John Adamcio, Andrew Clements, Joseph Gibson, Alexander Kuchta, John Matusiak, Basil Stoyka, Paul Wesche, Christopher Wojcik, Andrew Yavornitzky, and John Zdinak; Priests John Baker, Stephen Hrycyniak, Herman Kincaid, and Nathan Kroll; and Mr. Sam D'Fantis, Mr. Michael Herzak Jr., Ms. Kitty Mabus, and Mrs. Ann Marie Mecera.

Others present included Archpriest John Jillions, OCA Chancellor; Philip Sokolov.

#### III. INTRODUCTORY REMARKS, APPOINTMENTS.

- A. After introductory remarks, Archbishop Nikon turned over the chair to Archpriest John Zdinak, Chancellor.
- **B.** Father Zdinak moved that Archpriests John Matusiak and Mark Hodges and Mrs. Ann Marie Mecera serve as the Assembly secretariat, and that Archpriest John Adamcio, Priest Nicholas Finley, and Ms. Kitty Mabus serve on the nominating committee. He further moved that Archpriest Christopher Wojcik, Priest Stephen Hrycyniak and Doris Weissman serve on the resolutions committee. All deacons in attendance will serve as tellers, with the senior deacon serving as head teller.
- **C.** Father Zdinak moved that the Finance Committee will present the proposed 2013 budget, and that they be empowered to adjust in light of many uncertainties; seconded by Father Hrycyniak. Passed.

#### IV. CHANCELLOR'S REPORT.

- A. Father Zdinak reported that, on August 24, 2012, the Holy Synod received a accusation of violation of the OCA's sexual misconduct policy on the part of Bishop Matthias. A copy was sent to him and to Father John Jillions, OCA Chancellor. The matter immediately left our jurisdiction as a diocese to deal with the situation, because it was our ruling hierarch. Father Jillions and the Holy Synod dealt with it directly. We had no involvement with the response team since that time. The bishops were already dealing with other dioceses, so they asked me to act as Administrator. Eventually, everyone received the letters and the adjudication from the Synod, as well as the letter of apology from Bishop Matthias, which raised a considerable number of questions, emails, etc. Father Zdinak also clarified that a web site, which supposedly contained all of the the accusations, alleged that he had verified the accusations. He denied this. He also noted that an e-mail alleged that he had publicly asked for the resignation of Bishop Matthias. He affirmed, "I never publicly said that." The adjudication has come down from the Holy Synod, which in turn sent His Eminence, Archbishop Nikon, to our meetings. He added that he had invited Father Jillions to be with us to hear us and to give us a way to express ourselves on these issues, and he invited him to explain the process.
- B. Father Jillions thanked the Council, stating that he was grateful to meet. He reported that he had been involved at the very beginning of the process, as noted by Father Zdinak. When the initial complaint was received, an initial interview with Bishop Matthias took place. It had been determined that the matter was serious enough to gather a response team, which took some time. The team consisted of three individuals, all Orthodox Christians: a female lawyer, a Serbian Orthodox Christian, who was very familiar with sexual misconduct issues; Dr. Albert Rossi; and Protodeacon Michael Myers (Bulgarian Diocese), who had a mental health background and was familiar with the Metropolitan Council. Team members interviewed the complainant, others, and Bishop Matthias. Subsequently, they filed a 100-page report with the Holy Synod, the members of which reviewed the findings and wrote the letter that had been distributed. He suggested that Archbishop Nikon relate this internal process.
- C. Archbishop Nikon confirmed that the Lesser Synod received the response team's report. It then was shared with the full Holy Synod, the members of which agreed with the response team's recommendations. It was felt that a letter needed to be sent to the diocese. He noted that, while the letter had been perceived in a negative manner, it should not have been, as everything had been done according to the procedures. Central is the expectation that Bishop Matthias would participate in a program of psychological counseling for an extended period. He added that some had incorrectly concluded that Bishop Matthias would automatically be returned to his post, but this was not the intent of the letter, which was purely a matter of information.

In response to the above, a lengthy discussion ensued. At its conclusion, Father Zdinak noted that there is no consensus, and that the division that is occurring is painful. Further discussion will be taken up during the Assembly plenary session.

#### V. ADJOURNMENT.

There being no further business, and upon motion by Father Adamcio, seconded by Father Hrycyniak, the meeting adjourned at 10:40 p.m. with the singing of the Hymn to the Mother of God.

The meeting opened with the singing of "O Heavenly King" led by His Beatitude, Metropolitan Tikhon, at 10:00 a.m.

#### II. ATTENDANCE.

Present were His Beatitude, Metropolitan Tikhon; His Grace, Bishop Melchisidek; His Grace, Bishop Alexander; Archpriest John Zdinak, Chancellor; Archpriests John Matusiak, Secretary; Mr. Robert Koncel, Treasurer; Diocesan Council members Archpriests Alexander Kuchta, Basil Stoyka, and Christopher Wojcik; Priests Nicholas Finley, and Stephen Hrycyniak; Mr. Sam D'Fantis, Mr. Michael Dorosh; Mr. Dennis Garlick, Mr. Michael Herzak, Jr., Ms. Kitty Mabus, and Mrs. Ann Marie Mecera; Bishop's Council members Archpriests Andrew Clements, Timothy Sawchak, Paul Wesche, and Andrew Yavornitzky; and Priests John Baker, Joseph Gibson, and Herman Kincaid. Also present was Mr. Philip Sokolov. His Grace, Bishop Matthias, was present for the afternoon session.

#### III. CHANCELLOR'S REPORT.

- **A.** Father Zdinak reported that generally things in the Diocese are calm, although there are a number of issues that need to be addressed and resolved.
- **B.** Numerous parish meetings have been held in recent weeks. Financial statements are being used for the ongoing stewardship study. Parish Council elections will not be approved until all required materials have been received.
- C. Father Zdinak reported on clergy transfers, his role as Synodal liaison, and related matters.

#### IV. ADDITIONS TO WRITTEN DEANERY REPORTS.

- **A.** Columbus Deanery. Father Gibson reported that things are tumultuous due to concerns with regard to His Grace, Bishop Matthias. A lot of energy has been spent on this. Otherwise, the deanery is growing.
- **B. Michigan Deanery.** Father Yavronitzky reported that Detroit's Saints Peter and Paul Cathedral has been the center for the work of the Orthodox Diocese Outreach, providing dinners for neighborhood residents every Sunday. It is hoped that this ministry will be written up and posted as it may inspire others.

#### V. TREASURER'S REPORT.

- **A.** Mr. Koncel offered a detailed review of his written report. With regard to parishes that are in arrears in 2012 assessments, he noted that attempts are being made to receive payment. He referenced a list of parishes that are "in extreme arrears with assessments that won't ever come in and should be written off. We did this one time before and there is a need need to do it again." The Diocesan Council will consider this as a Council in the future.
- **B.** With regard to investment accounts, he reported that deposits had tripled in value during the past 13 years.
- C. He stated that he had a written report from the Finance Committee, portions of which can be obtained from him upon request from him. He would like to build up the maintenance fund. He noted that should Father John Baker pursue an on-line course provided by the insurance company, a 10% savings on premiums could be realized. He also recommended that money can be saved by raising the deductible from \$500.00 to \$2,500.00.
- **D.** He reported that the Audit Committee recommended investing in higher yield funds. The Finance Committee will consider various options.
- **E.** With regard to building maintenance, he noted that a list and photos of needs had been developed in June 2012 with the assistance of Father Baker. These were reviewed by the Finance Committee, the members of which will prioritize same and procure estimates.

#### VI. OPEN DISCUSSION WITH METROPOLITAN TIKHON AND OTHER HIERARCHS.

- **A.** Metropolitan Tikhon thanked those gathered for their presence and work and stated that the purpose of his visit and that of the other hierarchs was to address the current situation in the Diocese. He reviewed his meeting with the Deans on 18 February 2013 and noted that the same roundtable format would be observed by the Diocesan Council.
- **B.** He assured those present that the Holy Synod of Bishops had received and read a variety of correspondences, both signed and unsigned, and that the situation had been thoroughly discussed.
- **C.** Upon the request of Metropolitan Tikhon, Bishop Alexander presented an overview of the matters at hand, in which he reviewed developments since August 2012.
- **D.** Each member of the Diocesan Council in turn offered his or her opinions in an honest and open manner, after which Bishop Matthias was invited to join and address the gathering.
- **E.** After every member of the Diocesan Council responded, Metropolitan Tikhon stated that he will bring the matter before the members of the Lesser Synod during the next week and to the full Holy Synod for final disposition.

#### VII. OTHER BUSINESS.

A. Stewardship Study Report. Father Hryciniak reported that unrestricted and restricted income, reported membership, and the current assessment levels had been reviewed from a variety of vantage points to discern the overall impact should a percentage system be introduced to replace the current assessment system. Financial data was submitted by 26 parishes – the majority of parishes did not respond – had been studied. Consequently, it is not possible with limited data to guage the impact of percentage giving vs. the current assessments. There is a need for the Diocese to ensure that all parishes submit data in order to generate a balanced and accurate study.

#### DIOCESAN COUNCIL MEETING • 19 FEBRUARY 2013 • 2

- **B.** Archbishop Job Seminarian Scholarship Fund. Ms. Mabus asked for details on the fund and how it might be funded and expanded. Mr. Koncel suggested that a committee be formed to review this matter, adding that there was \$10,000.00 that had not been distributed last year. In response to a question as to the intent of the fund, Bishop Matthias stated that it was to be an annual appeal to increase funds available for diocesan seminarians, with the intention of establishing an endowment. After discussion, it was decided to designate a specific time frame possibly August 2013 to make a public appeal. Mrs. Mecera, Ms. Mabus and Father Matusiak agreed to develop an appeal for presentation at the next Diocesan Council meeting.
- C. 2013 Diocesan Assembly. It was decided to hold the Assembly in early October in Chicago. The possibility of using a hotel near O'Hare International, with sessions at Holy Resurrection Serbian Orthodox Cathedral, was raised. A local committee will be formed, while Mary Jane Lucak will serve as Assembly manager.
- D. Letter of Archpriest Daniel Rentel. After discussing a letter from Father Rentel concerning compensation for Father Zdinak in light of his additional duties as Diocesan Administrator duties he normally would not oversee it was decided upon motion by Father Wojcik, seconded by Father Finley, to give Father Zdinak an additional \$1,152.53 per month with corresponding adjustments for Social Security and pension, retroactive to 1 January 2013. The motion passed with two opposed. In a related matter, Father Rentel's suggestion to reinstitute the position of Parish Health Coordinator was tabled, in light of the fact that Mr. Joseph Kormos had accepted a similar position within the Archdiocese of Pittsburgh and Western Pennsylvania.

#### IX. NEXT MEETING, ADJOURNMENT.

- A. The next meeting of the Bishop's and Diocesan Councils will take place in Chicago June 17-18, 2013.
- **B.** Council members thanked Father Baker and parishioners for providing transportation, lunch, and other essentials.
- C. The meeting adjourned with prayer at 2:45 p.m. upon motion by Mr. Garlick, seconded by Mr. Dorosh.

#### III. EXECUTIVE SESSION.

- **A.** a \$1,000 monthly stipend for a period of one and one half years;
- **B.** health insurance benefits to include full hospitalization for 12 months and 6 months of supplemental health insurance for Medicare:
- C. moving expenses within the continental U.S.; and
- **D.** the car (2008 Ford Edge).

#### IV. ADJOURNMENT.

There being no further business, the conference call concluded with the Prayer to the Theotokos led by Father Zdinak at 8:46 p.m. upon motion by Father Kuchta, seconded by Mrs. Mecera.

#### V. ADDENDUM.

The above actions were later amended via e-vote on Friday, 5 April 2013, to the effect that

- A. the stipend of \$1,000 monthly be extended from 18 months to 24 months; and
- **B.** the Health Insurance benefits be changed to 12 months of Bishop Matthias's current full hospitalization and 12 months of supplemental health insurance for Medicare. (This is an additional 6 months of supplemental to our original action.)

#### MEETING OF THE DIOCESAN COUNCIL OF THE DIOCESE OF THE MIDWEST

Holiday Inn Midway, Chicago, Illinois 18 June 2013

#### I. OPENING.

The meeting opened with the singing of the Ascension Troparion led by His Grace, Bishop Alexander, *Locum Tenens*, at 8:34 a.m., after which the day's readings from Acts and the Gospel of Saint John were read by Michael Herzak and Priest Nicholas Finley.

#### II. ATTENDANCE.

Bishop Alexander, Archpriest John Zdinak, Archpriest Nathan Kroll, Archpriest Christopher Wojcik, Samuel D'Fantis, Michael Dorosh, Michael Herzak Jr., Dennis Garlick, Priest Nicholas Finley, Archpriest Alexander Kuchta, Kitty Mabus, Archpriest Basil Stoyka, Archpriest John Matusiak.

Also present was Philip Sokolov.

#### III. MINUTES OF THE PREVIOUS MEETING.

Reading and acceptance of the minutes of the previous meeting were postponed until later.

#### IV. BISHOPALEXANDER'S REPORT.

Bishop Alexander offered introductory remarks concerning his appointment as *Locum Tenens*, noting that he sees his function as one of a "placeholder" until such time as an election of a new diocesan bishop is deemed appropriate. He spoke of the importance of a time of healing in the diocese in the effort to building up the Body of Christ. He fielded a number of questions and comments.

#### V. CHANCELLOR'S REPORT.

- **A.** Father John Z. reported that he had met with Priest John Baker, who had served as His Grace, Bishop Matthias' personal secretary in addition to his duties as diocesan property manager and rector of Christ the Savior Church, noting that since we do not have a ruling bishop there is no need for a secretary. He discussed Father John B.'s remuneration, proposing that he continue to receive \$500.00 per month, which passed unanimously upon motion by Father Christopher W., seconded by Father Nicholas F..
- **B.** Ongoing issues with the leaking roof over the dining room of the bishop's apartment, the need for extensive tuck-pointing, and issues with one of the chimneys on Christ the Savior Church were noted. A bid for \$128,000.00 was received for tuckpointing both buildings. Additional property issues include sewer lines, which recently backed up and left raw sewage in the residence basement, and a number of trees that need to be trimmed.
- C. With regard to the merger between Christ the Savior parish and the diocese, Father John Z. proposed that an engineering company be engaged to assess the feasibility of the entire facility, after which an acceptable, agreeable mutual arrangement between the parish and diocese, indicating clearly who is responsible for what, be developed. After discussion, it was suggested to allocate \$5,000.00 for use by a committee charged with addressing these tasks which passed upon motion by Father Basil S., seconded by Dennis G.
- **D.** With regard to the Parish Development and Missions Committee, Father John Z. observed that it should be reconstituted for the purpose of reviewing and establishing grants. Possible committee members include Father Thomas M., chair, and Father Paul W., Ann Marie M., Archpriest Daniel Rentel, Priest Maximus Cabey, Simeon Morbey, Alexa Geeza, Jan Labun, Michael Tabling, and Sean Cunningham. Upon motion by Father Nicholas F., seconded by Dennis G., it was decided unanimously to reconstitute the committee.
- E. Questions were fielded by Bishop Alexander and Father John Z. with regard to the status of liturgical directives that had been put in place in recent years; the status of Saint John Monastery, Hiram, OH; and the diocesan archives stored in the basement of Christ the Savior Church.

#### VI. DEANERY REPORTS.

- A. Chicago Deanery. Father Thomas M., Dean, reported that he was elected Dean to succeed Priest Herman Kincaid. He spoke of the most recent basement flood at Saint Joseph Church, Wheaton, IL the parish's fifth since 2002. He also reported that Priest Danial Doss has been appointed priest-in-charge of Holy Apostles Mission, Bloomington-Normal, IL.
- **B.** Cleveland Deanery. Father John Z., in the absence of Archpriest Andrew Clements, Dean, reported that the latter had been unanimously reelected Dean. As an expression of solidarity, deanery clergy asked Priest Matthew Moriak to host the next deanery meeting. The clergy also decided to invite Priest Elijah Mueller, Late Vocations Coordinator, to offer a deanery-wide presentation on the program and address questions and concerns. The 100th anniversary of Saints Peter and Paul Church, Lorain, OH and the 30th anniversary of Saint Innocent Church, Olmsted Falls, OH, were noted
- **C. Indianapolis Deanery.** Father John Z., in the absence of Archpriest Joseph Gibson, Dean, reported on the latter's health issues. He also reported that Archpriest Ted Bobosh had been elected Dean, effective 1 July 2013.
- **D.** Kansas City Deanery. Father Timothy S. reported that he also had been reelected Dean. He noted that Father Elijah M. had visited Kansas City, where there are four individuals capable of assisting with instruction. The

- missions in Rolla, MO [Deacon Joel Wilson] and Joplin, MO [Priest Michael Kuzara] are doing well. Saint Nicholas Mission, Lawrence, KS, is in the midst of purchasing property.
- **E. Michigan Deanery.** Father John Z., in the absence of Archpriest Andrew Yavornitzky, Dean, reported that the latter is recovering from back surgery.
- **F. Minneapolis Deanery.** Father Paul W. reported that he had been reelected Dean. He noted that the deanery clergy had requested that the Holy Synod review the policies and procedures for sexual misconduct when a bishop is involved; that the few remaining members of Saint Nicholas Church, Chisholm, MN, had voted to close the parish; that the possibility of closing the missions in Anoka, MN and Chisago City, WI is being explored, along with the possibility of establishing a new mission; that Archpriest Vladimir Lecko and Priest Gregory Grivna are retiring; and that Saint Herman Church, Minneapolis, has had a new influx of parishioners, some of whom had donated an icon of Saint John Maximovitch to the parish.

#### VII. ACCEPTANCE OF MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING.

The following corrections were noted.

- **A.** Concerning the February 2013 minutes, Kitty M. asked that, on page 2, we make it clear that we had voiced our concerns and opinions "to Bishop Matthias."
- **B.** Concerning the March 2013 minutes, Father Christopher W. asked that we simply publish a redacted set of minutes that only list the decisions in section IV. Further, It was noted that an e-vote had been taken to extend benefits for two additional years.

There being no additional corrections or revisions, the minutes were accepted upon motion by Father Christopher W., seconded by Father Alex K.

#### VIII. METROPOLITAN COUNCIL REPRESENTATIVES' REPORT.

The representatives' written report is attached to these minutes and made a part thereof. Father Alex K. added that the most recent meeting was very positive and that the Metropolitan Council committees have taken on a lot of work, and are approaching it with seriousness. He noted that the next All-American Council has been postponed until 2015. After sharing ideas with regard to background checks, it was the general consensus that we should pursue background checks of all priests and deacons, with similar checks for subdeacons and readers undertaken by their respective parishes.

#### IX. TREASURER'S REPORT.

Father John Z., in the absence of Treasurer Rob Koncel, gave the Treasurer's report, nothing that at present the diocese is solvent. He reported that the financial report will be sent to everyone via e-mail.

#### X. "SUPPORT OUR SEMINARIANS" APPEAL.

Father John M. reported on the work he, Ann Marie M., and Kitty M. have done in this regard and distributed sample resources to be posted on the diocesan web site and mailed in hard copy to all parishes for distribution. It was the consensus that the appeal will be pursued in August, with 25 August designated as "SOS Sunday." It was noted that the seminarians are receiving "grants," not "scholarships. All is in place for a successful appeal.

#### XI. LATE VOCATIONS REPORT.

Father Elijah M. and Presvytera Rebecca Luft oversee the program. It was noted that the Bishop's Council had agreed that Father Elijah should be compensated for travel.

#### XII. 2013 DIOCESAN ASSEMBLY.

It was the consensus that the Assembly be a one-day event on Tuesday, 8 October 2013 in the Chicago area. The Diocesan Council will meet on Monday, 7 October. Additional information will be distributed as it becomes available.

#### XIII. ADJOURNMENT.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned with prayer at 2:23 p.m. upon motion by Sam D., seconded by Dennis G.

#### Metropolitan Council Report - Spring 2013 Meeting

Meetings of the Metropolitan Council (MC) which took place February 26 – 28 were the first to take place since the election of Metropolitan Tikhon in November of 2012 and after the February meeting of our Diocesan Council, at which we spoke with the Metropolitan, and Bishops Alexander and Melchisedek about Bishop Matthias. The atmosphere of these meetings was markedly different from previous MC meetings where there was a great deal of tension associated with our former Metropolitan Jonah. It was obvious to all who had been present for those earlier meetings that we were now being blessed with a normalcy and lack of strife absent for so long. This new reality was commented on by Frs. Jillions and Tosi. There is definitely a more pleasant and relaxed atmosphere at the chancery.

An effort to make the MC meetings more efficient and productive is under way. An atmosphere of trust seems to be taking hold and because of this, it is hoped that some committees can be streamlined. For example: the Internal governance and Council development committees will be merged. There will be more of an effort to do more of the essential work of the MC at a committee level so that so that more developed recommendations might be brought to the full council for ratification rather than protracted discussion on each issue. A Reorganization Work Group is also studying what church work is being done in the Church at large. The goal is to determine which tasks are best done at what level in the Church: centrally or locally. The group hopes to publish their findings this month.

Postconciliar work of the 16<sup>th</sup> AAC in 2011 continues. One result of this work has led to continuing education for our clergy. The Holy Synod of Bishops recently mandated 20 hours per year of education for priests. This is very new for us and it's not completely understood how this will be done. However, I can report that continuing education was one topic of the most recent Chicago Deanery meeting with ideas as to how we can work towards fulfilling the mandate.

The Office of Response to Sexual Misconduct Allegations (ORSMA) is now functioning and directed Ms Cindy Davis who has a social work background and experience in this area. Her efforts will involve dealing with allegations of misconduct brought to the attention of the Chancery and also with prevention. There is still much to be worked out with respect to coordinating the work of ORSMA, the MC's legal committee, OCA General Council, the Sexual Misconduct Policy Advisory Committee and the Crisis Management Team. I should mention that when the MC met in February, there were only a few open active misconduct cases where at the September 2012 meeting there were some 19 open cases.

A discussion on the 18<sup>th</sup> AAC was held. Because of extraordinary expenses to our parishes due to the November 2012 Council and lack of clarity on how to deal with our most current financial challenges, a motion by the MC to postpone this Council until 2015 was passed. (The Holy Synod later ratified this decision.)

The OCA is facing very difficult financial issues. Because of the resolution from the 16<sup>th</sup> AAC to reduce annual assessments, and some unforeseen expenses we are running a rather large deficit, projected to be nearly \$189K for 2013. Also contributing to the deficit are reduced census figures with OCA membership having dropped by 1000. The financial development committee is working to revive a stewardship program (something along the lines of FOS, but definitely not called `FOS') that would help with this issue. Chancellors and Diocesan treasurers have been meeting with OCA officers to clarify issues and to map out a plan to move to a proportional giving/stewardship model to fund the OCA. All involved with this process have stated their support for it, but it's not entirely clear as to how this will finally work out. I am getting the impression that some of the newest members of the MC who were the

loudest supporters of the assessment reduction resolution may be seeing things a bit differently, being present in the Chancery and realizing how few people are doing so much work. This is not the OCA of the 90s and 00s when there were in excess of 30 full and part time Chancery employees. To summarize, when it comes to the subject of funding the OCA, there are presently more questions than answers.

One of the last items of MC agenda had to do with a presentation of our General Council, Thaddeus Wojcik. I asked a question of our GC and MC that I've asked here, regarding background checks of clergy. We were told by one of the bishops present at the MC meeting that in his diocese these background checks are done every two years and that files are maintained at his chancery. I've long felt that this is something that should be done by our Diocesan Authority with files maintained here. I would recommend that this would also be our policy and that our Diocesan Council would ask our chancellor and chancery staff (and perhaps other capable and trustworthy persons) to create restricted personnel files for background checks that can only be accessed by the Chancellor and Bishop. It's essential that we begin to do these checks and also essential that confidentiality for all diocesan clergy be maintained. When this policy is in place we will be able to say without qualification that we are doing our due diligence and have a reasonable amount of confidence that our diocesan parishes are safe places to be.

# **DIOCESE OF THE MIDWEST**

# **Diocesan Bylaws**

(Approved 1996)

- I. The Diocese of the Midwest (hereinafter referred to as Diocese) is comprised of faithful Orthodox Christians united in local worshipping communities (hereinafter referred to as Parishes) within the territory assigned to it by the Holy Synod of Bishops of the Orthodox Church in America. It is a non-profit corporation chartered under the laws of the State of Illinois.
  - A. The Corporate Officers shall be: Diocesan Bishop as President, Chancellor as Vice President, Diocesan Secretary as Secretary, and Diocesan Treasurer as Treasurer.
  - B. A candidate for Bishop is nominated, elected, consecrated and/or installed as described in the Statue of the Orthodox Church in America (OCA), Article VI, Sections 9-11. The Diocesan Chancellor, Secretary, and Treasurer are appointed by the Bishop, as described in the Statute of the OCA, Article VI, Section 4, part 1. (Also see Article VIII, Section 6.)
  - C. The Bishop shall preside at the Diocesan Assembly and at the Diocesan Council meetings. The Bishop may appoint Vice Chair(s) at Diocesan Assemblies and Diocesan Council meetings.
  - D. The Bishop is the keeper of the corporate seal.
  - E. The Chancellor shall act as a liaison between the Diocesan Bishop and deans, clergy, parishes and Diocesan departments and committees. He is responsible for implementing the decisions of the Bishop, Diocesan Assemblies, Council, Bishop's Council, and any departments and committees. He will co-ordinate overall operation of the Chancery office and together with the Bishop be responsible for administration of the Diocese and its concerns.
  - F. The Secretary shall be responsible for:
    - 1. Keeping an accurate record of all Diocesan Council meetings and all Diocesan Assembles:
    - 2. The notification of all parishes of all such meetings;
    - 3. Performing such other duties as may be assigned by the Diocesan Bishop, Bylaw, and decision of the Diocesan Assembly or Council.
  - G. The Treasurer shall be responsible for:
    - 1. Overseeing the receipt, safekeeping, and proper disbursement of all money and other property of the Diocese entrusted into his care, according to the direction of the Diocesan Assembly or Diocesan Council;
    - 2. Providing a financial statement at the Diocesan Assembly and at such other times as may be requested by the Diocesan Council. The annual financial statement shall be audited and certified as provided in the Rules of Procedure;
    - 3. Having a complete account of the finances of the Diocese on books which shall be and remain the property of the Diocese;
    - 4. Such other duties as may be assigned by the Bishop, Bylaws, Rules of Procedure, and decision of the Diocesan Assembly or Council.

- H. The execution of contracts, not included in the Diocesan Operating budget, and authorized by the Diocesan Council may be accomplished with the signature of one of the following: The Bishop, Chancellor, Treasurer, or Secretary.
- I. The establishment of financial accounts and payment of funds may be accomplished with no less than two signatures of the following: The Bishop, Chancellor, Treasurer, or Secretary.
- II. The Annual Diocesan Assembly is the annual corporate meeting. It is held on the first Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday in October and conducted in accordance with the provisions of the Statue of the Orthodox Church in America. (See Appendix No. 1.) The time of the Assembly may be changed for cause by the Bishop or Diocesan Council, with thirty (30) day notice to Diocesan Parishes and Clergy. Extraordinary Assemblies may be convoked as described in the Statute of the OCA, Article VII, Section 4. The Diocesan Assembly shall elect:
  - A. One (1) Clergy Vice Chairman and one (1) Lay Vice Chairman.
  - B. Diocesan Council Representatives:
    - 1. There shall be ten (10) people, [five (5) clergy and five (5) lay elected atlarge]. Each year at the annual Diocesan Assembly, two (2) clergy and two (2) lay representatives will be elected. A term in office on the Diocesan Council is three (3) years.
    - 2. The length of consecutive service as an elected member of the Diocesan Council is six (6) years. A one (1) year sabbatical is required before running again for election to the Diocesan Council.
  - C. Diocesan Representatives to the Metropolitan Council:
    - 1. There shall be two (2) representatives, one (1) clergy and one (1) lay, elected at the Diocesan Assembly. These representatives shall be elected at the Diocesan Assembly their three-year terms being staggered. Representatives to the Metropolitan Council are members of the Diocesan Council ex officio. The term of newly elected representatives shall begin with the first Metropolitan Council meeting of the new calendar year.
  - D. Auditing Committee:
    - 1. The Auditing Committee shall consist of three (3) members elected at-large for a three (3) year term. One member shall be elected at the annual Diocesan Assembly each year.
    - 2. The senior member (the person in the final year of his term) shall be the Chairman.
    - 3. The Auditing Committee shall review the financial operations of the Diocese and make a written report to the Diocesan Assembly; this report shall be mailed to the parishes (30) days prior to the annual Diocesan Assembly.
  - E. Advisory committees may be established by the Bishop or by the Diocesan Council with the Bishop's approval as deemed necessary.
  - F. Assistants to the Secretary and Treasurer. If it is deemed necessary to have

- assistants to the Secretary or the Treasurer, the Bishop shall appoint such persons as needed.
- G. The clergy and lay person receiving the next highest number of votes after vacancies on the Council have been filled are considered to be alternates who would fulfill the remainder of a vacant term of a Diocesan Council member or Diocesan Representative to the Metropolitan Council. In case of need, the Bishop may also appoint a temporary replacement until the next Diocesan Assembly.
- H. The Diocesan Assembly shall establish the fiscal year and annual Diocesan assessment. (cf. Statute of the OCA, Article VII, Sec. 3, d.)
- I. Removal from the Diocesan Council
  - 1. All Diocesan Council members must continue to fulfill the qualifications for membership in the Council, as mandated by the Diocesan Assembly, during their entire tenure of office. Members of the Council whose membership status in a Diocesan parish changes due to Sacramental participation, etc. are subject to removal.
  - 2. Council members whose parish membership changes because of a move outside the boundaries of their parish and the Diocese must resign their position.
  - 3. Three (3) absences from Diocesan Council meetings between Diocesan Assemblies may be considered a resignation from the Diocesan Council.
  - 4. All actions regarding removal are subject to the final decision of the Diocesan Bishop.
- J. A Nominating Committee of three (3) members shall be selected by the Diocesan Council. The members of the Committee are not to be candidates for election.
- K. The duties of the Nominating Committee shall be:
  - 1. To compile a list of candidates nominated by members of the Assembly prior to the election session;
  - 2. To maximize the number of candidates running for open positions;
  - 3. Not to endorse or recommend any candidate for election.
- L. Nominations from the floor shall be accepted. Voting is by secret ballot.
- M. One must be an accredited delegate of and present at the Diocesan Assembly to be nominated.
- N. All parishes are required to meet the financial obligations for the Diocesan Assembly (i.e., registration fees) for a minimum of one (1) clergy and one (1) lay delegate.
- O. All parishes are required to be current with their Central Annual and Diocesan Annual Assessments in order to have delegates seated at the Annual Diocesan Assembly.
- III. The Diocesan Council is the corporate board of Directors. The Diocesan Council shall be composed of:
  - A. Voting members:
    - 1. Ruling Bishop and any Auxiliary Bishops;

- 2. Diocesan Chancellor;
- 3. Diocesan Secretary;
- 4. Diocesan Treasurer;
- 5. Five (5) clergy (Priests and/or Deacons) and five (5) laity;
- 6. Representatives to the Metropolitan Council [one (1) clergy and one (1) lay].
- B. Non-Voting members:
  - 1. Deans:
  - 2. Editor of The Vigil;
  - 3. Department and committee chairmen
- C. The Bishop (and any Auxiliaries) and the Chancellor are "Ex-officio" voting members of the Council.
- IV. In the event of any conflicting provisions, the corporation and Statue of the Orthodox Church in America shall take precedence over those of the Diocese. The corporation and Bylaws of the Diocese shall take precedence over that of the parishes.
- V. If the Diocese is dissolved or ceases to exist, all assets held in the name of the Diocese shall become the property of the Orthodox Church in America.
- VI. These Bylaws can be amended by a two-third (2/3) vote at a Diocesan Assembly with the proviso that the exact text of any proposed amendment be mailed with the approval of the Bishop to all parishes for distribution to their members at least 30 days prior to the meeting.

# CHICAGO DEANERY REPORT – September, 2013 Submitted by Father Thomas Mueller, Dean

Lenten Vespers took place this year at Christ the Savior in Chicago, St Panteleimon in Summit, St Nicholas in Kenosha, and St Nicholas in Joliet. Bridegroom Matins on Palm Sunday evening was served at Holy Trinity Cathedral as usual. The theme for homilies or talks was the Beatitudes in the Gospel according to St Luke. Fathers Elijah Mueller, Thomas Mueller, Andrew Harrison, and Alexander Kuchta presented each of the Beatitudes. Before the service at Joliet on April 21st, the results of a deanery election conducted by email were announced. I was elected to a new term as dean, as confirmed by Bishop Alexander later that week. I stressed to those present at this brief meeting the need for the clergy and people of the deanery to be at peace with one another, and that I would try to focus humbly on our working cooperatively together. At our June deanery meeting, Fathers John Adamcio and Joseph Kopka were elected to remain in the positions of secretary and treasurer respectively. We continue to meet about every other month at various parishes.

We held two youth camps at Edwards YMCA Camp in East Troy, Wisconsin: a weekend winter camp in February and a summer camp in the first week of July. We are undergoing a demographic shift with some of our long-term older campers transitioning to summer jobs or schooling or college with younger kids in the 10 - 12 age range moving into the camp program. These camps continue to be very successful in terms of building youth community, religious education, character development, and a range of great activities. This is a camp setting with excellent facilities and a wide array of possible activities. Our counselors this year, in addition to myself, were: Father Joseph Kopka, Pat Labun, Helen Metanchuk, Amy Schwarze, Daria Mueller, and Nathan Shackleford. The summer camp featured a field trip to a horse show and animal farm at William's Bay, followed by Vespers and a pizza party at our Holy Theophany Chapel at William's Bay (Lake Geneva). We will try to attend a service at the Chapel in conjunction with a field trip at every camp, since the Chapel is only 25 minutes from the camp. Parishes sending youth to these camps were: Christ the Savior, Holy Trinity Cathedral, St. Joseph in Wheaton St. Luke in Palos Hills, St Makarios in Chicago, St Nicholas in Kenosha, and SS Cyril and Methodius in Milwaukee.

This year we are sending deanery seminarian stipends to Deacon Moses Hibbert of St Matthew in Green Bay and Alex Koranda of St. Pater & St Paul in Burr Ridge.

Fr. Danial Doss was transferred from his assignment at St Peter and St Paul in Burr Ridge to that of Priest in Charge at Holy Apostles Mission in Bloomington-Normal, IL. We suffered the repose of two people who were long and beloved members of our deanery community: Archpriest Oleg Mironowicz, former Chicago Dean and Dean of St George Cathedral for many years; and Gina Mueller. my own wife of 45 years, who reposed on August 29th after a sudden and very brief illness. We offer our sincere sympathies to Matushka Vera Mironowicz on the devastating loss of her dear husband, and to my family and the parishioners of SS Cyril and Methodius on the shocking loss of their mother and grandmother and my faithful partner in 29 years of work at the our parish in Milwaukee.

# **Since October 2012**

Highlights of Top Three Activities

- 1. In addition to the Sunday School that follows the 9:30 Liturgy, we established in fall 2012 a second Sunday School that follows the 11:30 Liturgy, given that there are some 20-25 children who attend the 11:30 service, most of whom are very young.
- 2. The kick-off for our 25th Anniversary year with a variety of events in Spring 2013, including special services, a Bright Friday wine and cheese night, a steak roast on Pentecost Week fast free Friday, etc.
- 3. In June 2013, we initiated a major publication effort on a variety of booklets that are distributed free of charge to parishioners, visitors, college students, and so on -- including -- a free prayerbook, "Daily Prayers for Orthodox Christians," "Meeting the Orthodox," "Third and Sixth Hours," "Preparation for the Reception of Holy Communion," "The Funeral Service," "The Panikhida," and a full-color children's photo Liturgy book, "We Are The Church." All of these are distributed free of charge within our parish. Funding came from various grants and special donations, especially the Farah Foundation.
- 4. Visits and programs: Fr. John Behr, Fr. Chad Hatfield, IOCC's Nicholas Chakos, Fr. Theodore Jurewicz, and others. Co-sponsored an Advent retreat with Holy Transfiguration Antiochian Church, Warrenville, IL.

#### Outreach and Charitable Activities

Quite a few, but the major ones are

- 1. Parish Charities: On the last Sunday of every month a second collection for Parish Charities is taken. Offerings are distributed to our parishioners who have hit on hard financial times. Monthly average is \$1,600.00, all of which is distributed to needy parishioners.
- 2. Clothing distribution for the homeless: We collect clothing and distribute it at the commuter train stations in Wheaton, Glen Ellyn, and Elmhurst, where there are always homeless people gathered.
- 3. Resale shop ministry: Clothing that is not appropriate for distribution at the commuter train stations is given to a local resale shop which, in turn, gives the parish credit coupons that are distributed to our needy parishioners who can then "spend" them to buy things they need at the shop.
- 4. Food collections: Non-perishable food is collected for the support of the residents of the Wheaton Shelter for Homeless Veterans.
- 5. Immigrant/refugee assistance: Basic services are offered to recent immigrants, refugees, etc., the most recent of which are from Iraq and Syria. Several parishioners teach English at the Peoples' Resource Center a block from the church on Saturdays.
- 6. College Ministry to students from Wheaton College, College of DuPage, UIC, Aurora University, and other area schools.
- 7. International: Sponsored visit by Nicholas Chakos of IOCC.
- 8. Deanery camp: Our youth and parents are most grateful for the Deanery's efforts with regard to summer and winter camps. Many staff members come from our parish.
- 9. Missiology study. In fall 2013, our parish was one of three in the OCA to participate in a detailed study and on-site visit by Archpriest Eric Tosi, OCA Secretary, who was completing his doctoral thesis in the field of missiology. During his three-day visit, he was able to interview our clergy, meet with and interview our parish council, and meet privately and in a group session with a cross section of over 50 parishioners from the 9:30 and 11:30 Liturgies.
- 10. International Photo Exhibit in Moscow: In October 2013, we hosted Vadim Arslanov, a professional photographer from Moscow and member of the OCA Representation Church there, who took some 1,600 photos of our church, the weekend services, a wedding, a baptism, a panikhida, etc. for a photo exhibition in Moscow on Orthodoxy in America. We also took him to several neighboring parishes, where he likewise took photos.
- 11. In an effort to reach out to Chicago-area graduates of St. Vladimir's Seminary from the Chicago area, we hosted a special dinner, reception and program at which Priest Alexander Rentel and Protodeacon Joseph Matusiak spoke. Over 20 alum attended, together with their families.

#### Major Challenges Faced

- 1. Basement flooding due to Wheaton's inadequate sewers. In June 2013 we experienced the fifth flooding of our basement since 2002 -- but this time without flood insurance, which we can no longer obtain. Basement has been "floodproofed" to the best of our ability after the 2010 flood, which minimized damages this year. Reconstruction ended in time for Sunday School in September. Wheaton finally has addressed its sewer issues.
- 2. The usual need to juggle inadequate space and moving people, especially on Sunday mornings. For example, we would love to have a Sunday morning adult class but literally have no where to hold it -- hall used for fellowship hour, basement and conference room in hall used for Sunday School, temple unavailable due to the late Liturgy.
- 3. Distance and traffic. The "average" parishioner lives at quite a distance from church and may commute equally great distances for work or business. This, combined with traffic issues, makes it difficult for many people to engage in weekday activities.

### Upcoming Special Events/Anniversaries - October 2013 to September 2014

25th Anniversary of our parish on the second Sunday of March 2014, but with a major celebration in early May. We anticipate that Metropolitan Tikhon and Bishop Alexander will be with us.

40th Ordination Anniversary of Father John Matusiak to diaconate November 2014, and priesthood January 2015.

Continuation and expansion of our "in house" publishing efforts, which will include publication of a book titled "Icons of Saint Joseph Church," with over 100 photos of icons in our church that are "one of a kind." The book will not only offer an account of each icon, but detail its origin, donors, occasion on which it was given to the parish, etc.

- Frs Alexander & Daniel, formerly of the Monastery of St. John the Theologian, have retired and taken up residence in Ukraine
- Tentative arrangements are being made for the monastery to come under the care of the Hermitage of the Holy Cross monastery (ROCOR) in West Virginia
- Organized and attended a Retirement Party for Frs Alexander (Cutler) & David (Kidd)
- Presided at Deanery Akathist on Sunday of the Cross—Holy Trinity, Parma
- Published "The Bible in a Year" study guide to read through the entire new Orthodox Study Bible (Compiled by Fr Jonathan Cholcher)
- Donated \$500 to St Vladimir's Camp & Retreat Center
- Granted a \$500 Scholarship to a Seminarian at St Vladimir's
- Holy Trinity to host a forum on October 27 concerning the Assembly of Canonical Orthodox Bishops of North America

Highlights of Top Three Activities	

In September, Fr. Stephen met with the community for their first All-Chapel meeting to discuss next steps the community needs to make and what the future possibilities are for the community such as obtaining a space to rent versus using another church's space, investigating the possibility of applying for mission parish status, and having a long-term goal of being assigned a resident priest.

The Chapel community had its first Saturday chapel picnic in September. Picnics had traditionally been brief events after a Sunday Divine Liturgy in the summer. The Saturday picnic allowed for more interaction among the faithful, opportunity for personal confessions to be heard, and Great Vespers to be prayed.

Fr. Stephen has initiated stewardship education through Sunday bulletins emailed every Sunday versus only on the Sundays when Divine Liturgy is served. This will culminate with a pledge drive specifically for the community in Athens (typically, chapel income is directed to St. Gregory's in Columbus as it is the chapel's sponsoring parish), but the chapel has received a blessing to open a bank account in the Athens vicinity.

#### Outreach and Charitable Activities

Donations throughout the year to a local charity, Good Works, Inc., a homeless shelter organization.

Major Challenges Faced

Lack of worship space. The community currently uses a Methodist church parish.

## Stewardship

Few services each month (1 Divine Liturgy each month and Great Vespers 3 times a year; during the weekend of the chapel picnic, Advent, and Great Lent). This makes it difficult to encourage greater commitment by the faithful and by potential new members.

Ability to communicate the chapel's existence to the Ohio University campus and surrounding communities. Any clergy and laity aware of Orthodox Christians living in the Athens area or attending Ohio University are encouraged to inform the residents and/or students of the chapel's existence. ## **Upcoming Special Events/Anniversaries - October 2013 to September 2014**

The Chapel community is scheduled to have another All-Chapel meeting in October to continue the process of selecting a rental space for the community.

The Chapel has received a blessing to submit 3 potential names to His Grace in for him to assign a name for the Chapel. The plan is to reach consensus concerning the three potential names during the meeting in October.

Once a rental space is obtained, the plan is to add an additional Divine Liturgy each month for a total of 2 each month. Also, the community will be able to pray Readers' Vespers on Saturday evenings and Typika on Sundays when there is no Divine Liturgy being served. The hope is the consistency of services each weekend will help encourage more to participate with the chapel community and commit time and resources to the chapel.

We need to completely resurface our parking lot at a cost of \$400,000; make repairs to our gymnasium roof for \$100,000; and do an overhaul of our Party Center to the tune of \$500,000.

Highlights of Top Three Activities

Fr. Stephen and Fr. Dan met with the parish in May after initiating a survey to assess the concerns and hopes of the parish faithful. The clergy challenged the faithful to decide whether they wanted to attempt to work toward improving the parish in order to keep the parish alive and functioning. The parish accepted the challenge. The long-term goal is to improve among other items, stewardship, worship, council administration, and institute ministries to prepare the parish for a resident priest.

Fr. Stephen served a Presanctified Liturgy and a Saturday Vespers during Great Lent allowing the community to pray those services for the first time in a number of years.

Other notable recent additions/firsts for the parish:

- Fr. Stephen has begun chairing monthly council meetings (dormant for a number of years).
- Fr. Dan has oversees the Sunday bulletins (dormant for at least a few years).
- Fr. Stephen initiated the first pledge drive in the parish's history. He provided stewardship education over the course of two months in the summer in the weekly bulletins.



Highlights of Top Three Activities

St. Theodosius Cathedral participates every year in the Tremont Arts Festival, a local festival in the Tremont area of Cleveland, where we are located. The Parish mans an information booth at the festival and tours are conducted all day during the two-day event. Our Choir participates in the live stage presentations during the festival. Hundreds of people are welcomed at the Cathedral during this event and the exposure has brought several of these people to the Orthodox faith.

The Men's Sausage making club is a new group in our parish and has succeeded in bringing the men of the parish together in a social environment and using their talents also to raise funds for the operation of the parish.

The parish also shares with St. Innocent Parish in Olmsted Falls a joint golf outing to raise funds for both parishes. This has been a great success and great cooperation between our two parishes.

St. Theodosius participates in the are food bank with Merrick House, an established community outreach group in the Tremont area for many years.

We also participate in their annual Angel Tree gifts for needy children during the Christmas

#### Season.

In addition we continue a monthly special offerings for: ST. Herman's House, a local ministry of Focus North America, St. Mary of Egypt, St. John Monastery in Hiram, IOCC, and many other local charities

#### Major Challenges Faced

The major challenge for our parish is our location. We are located on the South side of downtown Cleveland. The Greater Cleveland area has 35+ Orthodox Parishes, 6 of them are OCA Parishes. Most younger people with families move to and reside in the suburbs of Cleveland. We have, however, in spite of the natural attrition of an older parish, been able to maintain an steady membership. Many of the peole who find our parish, or the Orthodox faith in our parish are older and have no children living with them. Our Church School is not large in number as a result of this.

The second large challenge is the maintenance of a building that is 100+ years old. The Cathedral is always in need of repair and maintenance in one are or another. The utilities are high because of the age and construction of the temple. Insurance on the building is large because of the beauty and design of the building which would require a high replacement cost.

The parish contributes with the other local churches to support with cash and kind donations to the local food pantry. Holy Assumption has participated in this effort for a number of years.

Major Challenges Faced

This parish is faced with the steady loss of membership due to death, or the relocation of individuals and families looking for work. We will loss by the end of 2013 four adult members relocating for new jobs and one adult member relocating to Texas for family reasons. This brings our adult membership down to 24 adults and 8 children.

This parish has been operating with a revenue shortfall for the past five years and continues to draw from its savings to meeting operating expenses. With the loss of additional members, stewardship will be adversely effected and further increase the parish's need to draw from its limited savings. These savings will be exhausted within ten years.

Attracted new members is particularly challenging due to the demographics of the area. Marblehead is no longer simply a quarry site (which was historically its only major manufacturing operation. The area is now primarily a resort area and real estate values have skyrocketed making the purchase of a home in the village almost impossible for young couples. As a result, well-heeled retirees are moving in and buying up properties, tearing down the older home and building new and larger houses, which only further raise the property tax rate. Some of these individuals do explore the Orthodox Faith, but this is a slow process not always resulting in these individuals coming into the Church.

Another challenge concerns the limited number of youth in this parish. There has been no formal Religious Education Program here for 6 years. This is due to the fact that the parents simply would not bring their children to Church School. We suspended the program at the request of the volunteer teachers, who would be prepared and ready to teach only to be confronted with no students. I explained this to the parents of the parish and only one parent actually took up the challenge of presenting any sort of formal religious education to her sons. Of the 11 children in the parish, as of 2013, two families "home school" their children while the balance do nothing.

# Highlights of Top Three Activities

Each year our Church sponsors our Something Russian festival. The festival is a celebration of faith and culture that is the climax of year long fellowship and workshop activities to prepare for the festival on the first Tuesday and Wednesday of October each year. We host an average of 3000 people to share in Ethnic foods, Balalaika and Russian Dance performances by our own orchestra and dancers as well as organized Church tours and discussions. Over the past 2 years up to 30,000 dollars in contributions to local, regional and international charities have been distributed from our proceeds.

We are presently in the midst of a Church renovation and Iconography project to update and beautify our Church. We recently painted and restored the entire interior of the Church and added Icons to the Dome area. Phase 2 of our Project will include Iconography above the iconostasis and possibly the Altar Area.

We recently reorganized our Long Range planning committee and in October will begin focus group discussions to determine our path into the future and to begin the preparations for our 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebration in 2017

#### Outreach and Charitable Activities

Our parish sponsors a monthly hot meal which provides a hot meal to those in our community in need of food and fellowship opportunities. Our Parish has helped and supported members of the local community by providing Christmas gifts for needy families. We support the Local food bank and are looking into providing meals to School children over the weekends who may not have food at home. 10% of our Annual Festival profit is distributed to various organizations and charitable groups.

## Major Challenges Faced

The major challenge for our parish is growth and finance. Our recently implemented pldge system has helped us to meet expenses and use fundraising for improvements and charity. But the economic situation surrounding our parish has caused us to loose many of our young families and college students who move away to find jobs. We continue to look to new ways of bringing others to the Church and though we make progress our growth vs attrition is minimal

**Reception of New Converts/Catechumens** St. Stephens was blessed to receive seven new converts to the Orthodox faith, as well as three new catechumens and regular visitors/inquirers.

**Lenten Speakers Series** This year we focused on the theme of Matthew 25 - Getting to know where the need is in our neighborhood and community, and where opportunities are to serve. We invited in speakers from our greater community with volunteer and work experience in foster care, youth mentoring, substance abuse counseling, and other local charity organizations. The series opened the doors to many volunteer opportunities for parishioners, as well as sharpening our focus on what kinds of outreach and event we want to do as a parish to reach out to those in need in our community.

**Near Completion of St. Maria House** This year we continued work on the St. Maria House, which will be dedicated as a hub for youth and young adult ministries as well as outreach events. The House was funded by a Parish Health Grant from the Diocese of the Midwest. Progress has been steady, relying on volunteer work by parishioners, including members of the youth group, and supervised/headed-up with the generous donation of time from Jewell and Jay Jeffries of Roachdale Building Supply. In September we had our first event, a "Back to School Cookout" which utilized the front porch "stage" of the House.

#### Outreach and Charitable Activities

St. Stephens has an ongoing donation/contribution to the local food pantry (F.I.S.H.) Fr. Joel is connected to a local/regional network of charitable organizations which communicates need and services of various churches/organizations. St. Stephens supports and refers needs that come to our attention to this network. We also support several outreach activities headed up by parishioners, including Achaius Ranch, a horse rescue youth ministry. Beginning in October, our Youth Group and older Church School class will be doing outreach ministry twice a month to our neighborhood nursing home. We also host a monthly "open stage" night for music and poetry readings, which is advertised in the community. We host occasional "cookouts" and public events for the neighborhood. In October, we will begin a monthly molieben service for healing and anointing of those suffering from cancer and other serious or chronic illnesses.

#### Major Challenges Faced

If St. Stephens continues to grow we will soon face space issues, especially with our fellowship hall. We are currently investigating what, if any, obstacles we would face in the future for parking lot/building expansion on our current property, even though there are no plans to expand until we have paid off our current mortgage.

The other challenge is finding and maintaining the balance between the desire to engage in more outreach in our community and increase activities at the parish and the realistic limitations of time/energy/work and family obligations of parishioners.

## **Upcoming Special Events/Anniversaries - October 2013 to September 2014**

October 12-13 – Visit from Bishop Gregory (ACROD) to Holy Transfiguration Orthodox Church in Crawfordsville. St. Stephens will be present to welcome the bishop of our sister parish here in town. We will also join with the prayers of consecration of a new cemetery at Holy Transfiguration, which St. Stephens is partnering in developing and maintaining.

St. Nicholas Family Game Night – date tba. We will be hosting a game night near the feast of St. Nicholas. We will be inviting foster family and mentor program participants to join us for this event.

Lenten Speaker Series – date/subject tba.

Official Opening of St. Maria House – We hope to officially open St. Maria House, most likely in the early spring of 2014.

#### Major Challenges Faced

This year more than any in the past five years, we have been financially challenged. Though we've added wonderful members, we have many handicapped members, or on disability, or out of work, or on welfare. The scandal of the past year negatively influenced two households, and though they are both now back (part time), we have yet to receive their usual giving. We have gotten way behind on our assessments, and after repeatedly discussing it in council and to the congregation as a whole, we had a special collection to help begin to pay what we owe, and the people coordinated a chicken dinner barbeque fundraiser to help pay assessments. These did not garner as much as we hoped (the chicken dinner was a wonderful success for the people coming together and working for a common cause, but two other groups had chicken dinner cookout sales, one less than a block away in a busy intersection and the other at the biggest Protestant

"church" only a few blocks in the other direction).

A second challenge is our mid-week service: we've tried many things, and can't seem to get folks to come. Our latest attempt was a Bible Study, but again only one person came.

# REPORT OF THE MICHIGAN DEANERY TO THE $52^{nd}$ ASSEMBLY OF THE DIOCESE OF THE MIDWEST

Following a deliberate effort for more than a decade, all shared activities of the Michigan Deanery parishes are also shared with other OCA and pan-Orthodox parish communities. The four parishes in the metropolitan Detroit area (Holy Transfiguration in Livonia, Holy Trinity in Detroit, St. Mark in Rochester Hills and Ss. Peter and Paul Cathedral in Detroit) worship, outreach, celebrate and minister with others in the Council of Orthodox Christian Churches. The COCC, under the auspices of the St. John Chrysostom clergy brotherhood, is also the umbrella organization for the Orthodox Christian Women of Michigan (OCWM) and the recently established Orthodox Detroit Outreach (ODO). Deanery parish and personnel are among the leading participants in all of the collective activity.

The two western parishes (Holy Ascension in Albion and St. Demetrius in Jackson) also share their lives with other Orthodox Christian parishes from Lansing, Grand Rapids, and Battle Creek with the monastery of the Holy Dormition (Romanian OCA) in Rives Junction often being the focal point.

The Michigan Deanery is in the beginning phases of a mission outreach to the greater Kalamazoo area through the missionary work of Fr. Evangelos Pepps from Holy ascension in Albion.



#### Minneapolis Deanery

Since his retirement from the business world some twenty years ago or so (if I weren't writing this report on the deadline, I'd have time to get exact numbers!), Fr Gregory Grivna has served the Church as deacon and priest in some of the most remote parishes of the Minneapolis Deanery. Over the years, he and his wife, Elaine, were actively involved in the start-up of several missions throughout the Minneapolis Deanery. At the end of this year, he will retire from active service and, we hope, enjoy a much deserved rest from his self-sacrificing labors offered to the Church for the sake of Christ and His Holy Gospel, which he and his wife dearly love. He and Matushka Elaine, however, will continue to edify the faithful of the Minneapolis Deanery simply by their prayerful presence. With love and joy we express thanksgiving to God for the grace He has given our beloved brother and sister, Fr Greg and Matushka Elaine, to serve so faithfully and well. Axios! And, Many Years in health, prosperity and furtherance in all good things!

The missions of Christ the Savior in Anoka and Holy Cross in Chisago City, started about 15 years ago in these regions north of the Twin Cities area, have determined that they are not able to sustain these missions any longer. The faithful of these missions, with the blessing of His Grace and under the pastoral leadership of Fr Bill Neumann and Fr Greg Grivna, have been diligently exploring the possibility of closing each of their respective missions, and pooling their assets to start a new mission in the north metro region. Presently, with Fr Grivna looking forward to a much deserved retirement, it has been primarily Fr Bill and the faithful of these two missions working with the area Dean under the watchful eye of His Grace, +Alexander, to construct a plan that would outline the conditions needed to establish a new mission on a good foundation. Coming out of a meeting with His Grace and the area Dean only last week (while His Grace was on a pastoral visit in the Twin Cities), they expressed intent to seek involvement of the faithful and clergy of the Minneapolis Deanery, and the Diocese Mission Committees, in the construction of this plan. Although we would like to see definitive action by the end of December of this year, we have chosen to give first honor to prudence and not to rush the formation of a new mission. If necessary, we are open to a course of action in which we close the respective missions and place the pooled assets with the Diocese in escrow, to be reserved for the establishment of a new mission in the north metro area of the Twin Cities until such time that we believe that the desired conditions are sufficiently in place.

Holy Myrhhbearers Mission in St Cloud was established at around the same time as Christ the Savior and Holy Cross. It has been served faithfully and well from the start by Fr Nathan Kroll; yet, that mission, too, is struggling to make ends meet. With assistance from the Diocese, Fr Nathan and his wife, Matushka Heidi, are able to continue to serve the faithful in the St Cloud area through this mission outpost in the western and far western region of Minnesota. The status of the mission has been changed to that of a chapel to facilitate its pastoral administration. Even since the change of status, Holy Myrrhbearers has received an Orthodox couple who moved to the St Cloud area from Texas, and some inquirers who have become catechumens. With Fr Nathan, I am cautiously hopeful for the future of Holy Myrrhbearers.

Fr Nathan joins Fr Oliver Herbel (Holy Resurrection Mission in Fargo, ND) and Fr Anastassy Fehr (St Peter the Aleut Church in Minot, ND) in a very elite group of priests distinguished by their hardiness and

uncommon courage in serving the faithful in this western region of our diocese under the challenging circumstances peculiar to that part of the world. Cowboy country begins in Fargo, ND, (and you begin to smell it in St Cloud) and the world ends just a few miles west of Fr Oliver's mission there in Fargo. Once you get to St James, ND, you know that you're not in Kansas, anymore (okay, you weren't in Kansas to begin with – that's way south; but, you get the point); and then, a few hours farther west, you get to Fr Anastassy's parish in Minot. (From Minot you have to hold your breath for another eight or nine hours before you get to the front edge of the world where it begins again on the other side, and find yourself at the next Orthodox parish in Billings, MT, in the Diocese of the West.) Except that the faithful served by Fr Anastassy there in Minot are living and working in a town that has over the last few years turned into an oil-boom town. Which means lots of people of all descriptions, shapes, sizes and characters – including those who've forgotten what life is like where there's chocolate chip cookies – are making their way past St Cloud, past Fargo, and into this large gap past the world's last edge to take up their residence in Minot, some to spend time with those who've forgotten about chocolate chip cookies. Now you know you're not in Kansas anymore. Worse: for all that, you're not in the Emerald City, either. You can only thank God you're not in Rawlins, Wyoming.

What I'm leading to in this accurate description of the geography of this little known part of the world goes beyond the curiosity of Archimandrite Anastassy underneath a ten gallon hat instead of the more expected klobuk – or whatever it's called (he'd be on top of a horse, too, if it weren't for his health, and the fact that he's a Swiss-born Serb). It's to express, on behalf of the Deanery and I believe the faithful of the Diocese, sincere appreciation, even admiration, for the work these men, with their wives (except for Archimandrite Anastassy, who doesn't even have a horse), are doing here in cowboy country, in this isolated part of the world. Because of their work, this large gap between the front and back edges of the world for sure cannot be called "God-forsaken". May God strengthen them and richly bless them!

Back at the farm, in Northfield, about 45 minutes south of Minneapolis, Fr Christopher Maciolek and his wife, Gretchen, are working to establish a mission there. Fr Christopher has been working the Northfield area for a bit over two years now; and, by the grace of God, the seeds that he has been planting appear to be germinating. On average, about 20-25 faithful have been serving the Holy Liturgy every Sunday at the Northfield senior center; and, since last Spring, Fr Christopher expanded the worship schedule to include Saturday evening Vespers. This community of faithful in Northfield is technically a "mission exploration" under the patronage of the Three Holy Hierarchs. They have attracted a number of inquirers, and a number of them (I don't know the exact number, again because I'm writing this at the deadline) have become catechumens.

Such are the headlines of ecclesial life in the Minneapolis Deanery. I think I shall ask for some chocolate chip cookies at my parish's next Sunday morning coffee hour.

Lansing, Illinois October 8<sup>th</sup>, 2013

The primary responsibilities of the Treasurer are to oversee the financial affairs of the Diocese; monitor Diocesan investments, together with the Diocesan Council and Finance Committee; oversee the distribution of funds and judiciously invest Diocesan funds; and convene and chair regular and special Finance Committee meetings. The members of the Finance Committee currently are: Mr. Sam D'Fantis, Fr. Stephen Hrycyniak and Fr. John Zdniak. The Finance Committee also receives input from our Bookkeeper Phillip Sokolov and accountant Polly Walker.

#### **Attachment A:** 2012 Profit and Loss Budget vs. Actual

For 2012, based on the budget, we had projected an income from assessments of \$451,500. The actual income from assessments was \$439,632.35. The total received from assessments was \$11,867.651 less than anticipated. The total actual income from all sources was \$484,236.12 compared to \$451,500.00, a difference of \$32,736.12. This additional income to the Diocese was greater than anticipated and was primarily due to income from the 2012 Diocesan Assembly, income from investments and income received from various programs.

The total of all normal expenses for 2012 was \$412,281.80. This resulted in a surplus of ordinary income of \$71,954.32. Taking into consideration other income received and the interest expense on our loan, there was a net surplus of \$69,318.32.

The following is a summary of the major categories:

- The Parish Development Ministry expenses were \$2,721.71 greater than budgeted, \$102,721.71 vs. a budget of \$100,000.00. Note, this position was eliminated for 2013.
- Program expenses were \$4,691.73 less than budgeted, \$6,308.27 vs. \$11,000 budgeted.
- Diocesan Travel Expenses were \$10,815.97 less than budgeted, \$36,044.03 vs. \$46,860 budgeted.
- Diocesan Center Expenses were \$2,646.40 less than budgeted, \$16,673.60 vs. \$19,320 budgeted.
- Diocesan Staff Expenses were \$60,218.64 less than budgeted: \$66,809.03 vs. \$127,027.67.
- Repairs and Maintenance Expenses were \$6,738.53 greater than budgeted, \$16,338.53 vs. \$9,600

## Attachment C: 2013 Profit and Loss Budget vs. Actual: January thru June 30<sup>th</sup>, 2013

For the first six months of 2013, we had projected an income of \$223,385.02 from assessments. The actual Income was \$219,923.78. The amount received from assessments was \$3,461.24 less than anticipated. (Note, this was based on a membership of 5,195 individuals, but the actual membership for this year is 5,106). An additional \$6,018.61 was received from program income for total net income of \$225,942.39.

For the first six months of 2013, the total of all expenses is \$284,295.48. This resulted in a net deficit of \$33,471.31.

The following is a brief summary:

Total stipends were \$1,600 over budget, \$14,500 vs. \$12,900. This was due to the separation package for the Bishop being implemented where he will be receiving a \$1,000 per month stipend and a Diocesan Council motion to increase the Late Vocations Coordinator stipend to \$500 per month from \$250 per month.

The Diocesan Chancery expenses were \$12,527.05 over budget, \$54,454.23 vs. \$41,927.18. This overage was due primarily due to:

- No expense for the Convocation (\$9,250)
- The addition of the vehicle given to the Bishop as a gift as part of the separation package. This was entered as a Journal Entry (\$17,000) and is currently reflected as an expense in the Profit and Loss statement. Please note that the value of the vehicle at the time of the gift was actually estimated to be between \$8,000 and \$9,000). There was no monetary amount given to the Bishop.
- The cost of Diocesan Insurance was \$3,006.10 over budget, \$27.543.30 vs. \$24,537.20

Diocesan Payroll Expenses/Salary. The total budgeted was \$77,030.09 (\$57,065.32 plus \$19,973.77) vs. \$130,046.47 actual, a difference of \$53,007.38. Starting this year, the salaries for the priest and choir director from Christ the Savior Church are being paid for by the Diocese and in turn, Christ the Savior Church is reimbursing the Diocese for these salaries. A total of \$33,042 has been reimbursed which is for a total of 5 months, one month is lagging. For the 6 months, the total would have been \$39,650.40.

Professional Fees were \$116 under budget, \$4,903.98 vs. \$5,019.98 budgeted

Program Expenses were \$3,190.62 over budget, \$36,090.68 vs. \$33,900.06 budgeted.

Repairs and Maintenance was \$519.07 under budget, \$11,275.72 vs. \$11,794.79 budgeted.

Travel expenses were \$8,535.65 under budget, \$13,484.35 vs. \$22,020 budgeted.

Utility expenses were \$171.41 over budget, \$11,019.41 vs. \$10,848 budgeted.

As part of the Bishops separation package, \$4,750 was reimbursed for moving expenses.

# Attachment E: Diocesan Parish / Mission Development Fund Status as of August 31<sup>st</sup>, 2013:

The Mission Endowment Fund was created to provide additional funding to the Mission Department through its earnings on interest. The money is invested in both a Portfolio Fund (approximately 60%) and an Income Fund (approximately 40%) in an account with Salomon Smith Barney. We consider the Mission Endowment fund to be a long-term investment fund. As such, investment history has shown that having a mix of funds in equities and income funds provides the highest returns in the long term. Currently, the market continues to be very volatile.

As of June 30<sup>th</sup>, 2013, the total in the Mission Development Fund is \$364,032.25, compared to \$334,819.06 at the start of the year. Throughout the year, you can see that monthly totals have risen and fallen quite dramatically, hitting a fund high of \$380,040.78 at the end of July, 2013. Since we are in it for the long term, we are not looking at the short-term variations that the market will inevitably experience. To date, there have been no additional funds added to the Mission Endowment Fund. A summary of the monthly totals as of August 31st, 2013 as well as the progress since 12/31/1999 is shown in Attachment E.

# Attachment F: 2013 Fidelity Investment Account Status as of August 31<sup>st</sup>, 2013:

We have two money market Investment Accounts with Fidelity. The Operating Fund and Maintenance Reserve Fund. The Operating Fund consists of reserve funds for either planned or unplanned expenses. Note, since the fund totals do not vary very much, the following totals are as of 8/31/2013. As of 8/31/2013, the total in this fund is \$75,249.90. These reserve funds were created as a result of both known expenditures that we wanted to plan and budget for, such as the General Operating Reserve Fund (\$11,946.21), Auto Reserve Fund (\$20,303.69), and expenses that were incurred that we may be unprepared for; Legal (\$37,000) and Special Visit Reserve Funds (\$6,000). So that we would be prepared for the future, the Legal and Special Visit Reserve Funds were established to provide a cushion in these areas should these expenses be incurred. They have been funded in the past as planned expenditures from our operating budget.

The other money market account is our Maintenance Reserve Fund, Changed (Name changed from the Maintenance Endowment Reserve Fund at the 6/22/2012 Diocesan Council Meeting.) This was previously our Building Account. However, since no major building projects are planned for the future, the fund was renamed as a Maintenance Reserve Fund in order to have funds set aside for emergent, major maintenance should it become required. At the 6/22/2012 Diocesan Council Meeting, a motion was made and approved to transfer \$20,000 from the Special Visit Reserve Fund (\$26,000) to the Maintenance Reserve Fund. To date, this transfer took place on 12/24/2012. As of August 31<sup>st</sup>, 2013, there is a total of \$29,191.62 in this Money Market Account.

Since both of these funds are money market funds, the amount of interest earned on them is negligible. This information is also shown in the Balance Sheet in Attachment D as of 8/31/2013. A summary of the monthly totals as of August 31<sup>st</sup>, 2013 is shown in Attachment F.

#### **Attachment G:** Proposed Budget for 2014

The proposed 2014 budget is essentially the same as the budgets for 2010 through 2013. The major change between 2013 and 2014 is the agreed to salary compensation package for the Bishop. For the preparation of the 2013 Budget, the Finance Committee reviewed the draft budget. The budget presented reflects the current needs and supports the future needs and direction of the Diocese. In September and October, an electronic vote was taken for the proposed 2014 budget by the voting members of the Diocesan Council. It was approved. However, it will be discussed again at the Council meeting prior to the assembly where a formal vote will be taken for presentation to the delegates at the assembly.

Please see the Executive Summary on the first page of Attachment G followed by a detailed breakdown of projected income and expenses.

#### **INCOME SUMMARY:**

The 2014 budget is based on a membership total of 5,106, down from 5,195 from 2013. This is only an estimate at the writing of this report and is used for determining the estimated income for the Diocese. The actual membership number may be higher or lower.

Based on a motion at the 1995 Diocesan Assembly, the annual parish assessment for each adult shall be the current assessment plus an amount based on the previous 12 month Consumers Price Index (CPI), rounded up to the nearest dollar. However, based on the current economic situation and the fact that the Diocese continually strives to work within its budget, improving where required and cutting back were required, there is no proposed increase in the diocesan assessment for 2013. **Therefore, the yearly assessment for 2014 will remain at \$86.00 per adult member.** The \$86.00 assessment multiplied by the projected membership of 5,106 is \$439,116. The balance of the income is derived as follows:

\$9,250.00 is estimated to be received from the yearly Clergy Convocation. Note; the income from the Convocation is determined based on the projected expenses. It is meant to be a breakeven event.

As mentioned previously, the Diocese pays the salary priest and choir director of Christ the Savior Church. Christ the Savior Church in turn reimburses the Diocese this same amount. The estimated amount of the reimbursement for 2014 is \$80,596.80. Please note that this amount may increase, but should equal to the actual salaries paid in 2014, ending up being a wash.

These additional anticipated receipts along with the assessments bring the total projected income for the year 2014 to \$528,962.80

INSURANCE: This consists of our Umbrella coverage, Workers Compensation, Package Policy consisting of Property, Liability, Crime, Inland Marine and Auto Liability coverage for Diocesan Staff for a total budget of \$21,413.00.

REPAIRS AND MAINTENANCE: Repairs, \$12,000, Labor \$8,000, Supplies \$4,500 for a total budget of **\$24,500.00** 

UTILITIES: Electric: \$8,700, Gas: \$13,000 and Water/Sewer: \$2,600 for a total budget of **\$24,300.00**.

Total Diocesan Center Budget is \$70,213.00.

#### **DIOCESAN CHANCERY OFFICE:**

This category has categories such as: advertising, bank fees, dues and subscriptions, hospitality, internet service, investment management fees, office supplies, cleaning (Outside Contractors), postage, printing, professional fees for accounting, audit, legal, payroll preparation, the Clergy Convocation, security monitoring and telephone. The total budget is \$55,700.

#### The total of the above expenses for 2014 is \$475,702.27.

#### **Diocesan Loan information:**

The 5 year term for the original \$250,000 loan from Bank of America to cover major maintenance issues at both the residence and Christ the Savior Church was due in February of 2012. Loan renewal paperwork was submitted in December of 2011 and a new 5 year term for the loan was approved. The original interest rate for the loan was 7.1% with a 5 year balloon with monthly payments of \$1,814.81. The new 5 year term for the loan is for a starting balance of \$227,563.95 with an interest rate of 4.68%. Monthly payments are \$1,486.99, a savings of \$327.82/month or \$3,933.84 for the year. At the end of this 5 year term, 2017, the outstanding balance will be \$189,410.57. The fees to secure the loan were \$2,532.51. When the time comes, we will request another extension for the terms of the loan.

#### **LOAN INTEREST:**

The interest paid on our loan in 2014 from Bank of America will be \$10,021.24.

#### **Christ the Savior Church information:**

Since the property is shared between the Diocese (Residence) and Church (Christ the Savior Church / Bishops Chapel and Diocesan Offices), discussions were held between the Diocese and Christ the Savior Church. In an effort further unite the two entities; various options were discussed to come to a workable agreement. As a starting point, new in the 2013 Budget will be a line item under Income, CTS (Christ the Savior Church). Starting in 2013, the Diocese will be paying the Salaries of the Priest and Choir Director from the Diocesan Checking account. These expenses will be returned to the Diocese from Christ the Savior Church and shown under the line item CTS. Currently as it stands, the church will maintain its own bookkeeping and pay their own expenses as before. The year end financial records of the Church will be reviewed by the Diocese and members of Christ the Savior. Should there be a surplus at the end of the year, then it is planned to have the surplus divided in some manner between the church and the Diocese that will be for the benefit of all. As this is just a starting point, there will be further discussions held and a more refined plan developed. The above is still subject for final approval and at this point is considered a preliminary plan.

#### **ESCROWED FUNDS:**

Due to the fact that we do not currently have a Bishop, there are expenses that are not being paid such as the full salary, social security, pension, discretionary fund and travel expenses. Along with other additions and deletions, there is a surplus in the budget. Since it is unknown what will transpire in 2014, any additional funds are being placed in Escrow. This amount comes to \$43,239.28.

Adding the Loan Interest (\$10,021.24) and the Escrowed funds (\$43,239.28) to the total expenses, the total expenses for 2014 will equal \$528,962.80 which will equal the projected income which ends up as balanced budget.

#### **CLOSING:**

Beginning in 2009 we switched to using QuickBooks. With the current system setup, Polly, Philip, Fr. John and myself have been able to remotely access the data in QuickBooks at any time from our personal computers should the need arise. Also, in addition to all of the above, Polly reviews all of the income, expenses and investments and ensures that everything is categorized properly in QuickBooks and meets standard accounting practices given our current set-up. The goal when this effort was started was to ensure that the financial condition of the Diocese would remain transparent at any time. I believe that we have accomplished this

I would also like to thank Philip Sokolov for assuming the responsibilities and work of bookkeeper and Polly Walker as our accountant. I would also like to thank the other members of the Finance Committee, our Chancellor, Fr. John Zdniak, Mr. Sam D'Fantis and Fr. Stephen Hrycyniak, who all deserve a big thanks for the extra time and effort they put in throughout the year and once again, for their valuable advice and ideas presented throughout the year. Finally, I would again like to thank my wife Karen for her patience and support during this past year.

It has been a pleasure serving the Diocese as Treasurer this past year.

#### Audit findings: August 5-7 2013

The Diocesan Audit Committee performed a routine audit of the Operating Account, Checking Account, Investment Accounts and Payroll Records of the Diocese of the Midwest for the periods of July – December 2012 and January - June 2013. The audit was conducted as a select review of financial activity and presentation for the months of September and October 2012, and January and May 2013, by verifying check stubs, receipts and reports. This audit is not governed by accepted auditing standards.

Findings and recommendations are as follows:

#### **Checking Account:**

#### September 2012:

• Check # 11996 Kurt Baker; Payment overstated by \$63.32. Reimbursement of supplies purchased \$104.98. One of the attached receipts was for a purchase made using the Diocesan Credit Card and should not have been reimbursed to Fr. Baker.

#### October 2012:

No issues

#### January 2013:

- Check # 12139 St. Theodosius; Supporting detail for costs incurred was not provided for telephone expenses. Reimbursement was issued based on letter of request.
- Check #12109 St Makarios Mission; Check stub not on file for monthly payment \$833, check has
  cleared the bank and signature is on file.

#### May 2013:

No issues

#### **Payroll:**

Payroll was reviewed for the 12-month period of January to December of 2012. All 1099s, W2s and reports were verified. The following discrepancies were found:

 W2s that were issued for the year ending 2012 do not match the figures stated in the year-end balance sheet. This is the second year in a row that these numbers could not be verified for this reason. No explanation was given for the 2011 discrepancies.

#### **Investment Accounts:**

 Balances were checked on the original sheets from the bank/brokerage firms and totals were verified with reports submitted by the staff Reports were reviewed and checked.

#### **U. S. Savings Bonds:**

- We verified the bonds: three \$10,000.00 bonds purchased in October of 1992.
- Value, as of June 30, 2013, \$14,236 each for a total of \$42,708

#### **Recommendations:**

- All credit card charges must be supported by receipts detailing the items purchased, date, and cost. Detailed descriptions need to be provided for all charges for which the receipt is not explicit.
  - This recommendation by the auditors has been requested for the past six audits. It is imperative that use of the Diocesan Credit Card be supported by receipts. Also, travel expenses, including who was in attendance for a meal and the business purpose of the meal, should be identified on or attached to the receipt.
- Semi-annual documentation is required for audit purposes by July 31<sup>st</sup> of the current year. This includes all reports that are submitted to the Diocesan Council for meetings, Diocesan Council Minutes (including attachments), Treasurer's Reports (including Balance Sheet, P&L) and other informational or financial documents and reports. See attached list of required documents.

#### Report on Catechist and Diaconal Vocations Program for the Diocese of the Midwest: Diocesan Assembly

by Fr. Elijah Mueller, Diocesan Catechist and Diaconal Vocations Director. 13th June, 2013, revised for Diocesan Assembly, 25th September 2013

The Diocesan Catechist and Diaconal Vocations program has been running for 2 years. Continuing the vision of Archbishop Job and with the support of Bishop Alexander the program continues to develop. If the program is grow and develop, we feel there is need for more funding to address needs and accomplish more work toward goals.

#### **Accomplishments:**

- Continuing work with students in Detroit, Lincoln NE, Southern IL and Cincinnati area.
- New Programs in Milwaukee and Chicago
- Expanding faculty
- Live internet video participation across far flung locales, i.e., Chicago based instructor interacting with students in other locales simultaneously. Still working out kinks in this.

#### Developing

- Opening more locales: presently in discussion with Eastern OH (Indianapolis Deanery) and Kansas City.
- Work on developing shorter programs without vocational goal.
- Contact and beginning discussion with OCA Continuing Ed
- Examination, discussion of possible use of St. Andrew's House in Detroit, perhaps for faculty training and yearly gathering of all diocesan students.
- Connections with other Midwestern Dioceses (Bulgarian, Romanian).
- Kansas City Deanery Program is developing a stand-alone program under the aegis of the Diocesan Program, with local faculty under the guidance of the Diocesan Faculty and Director.
- Supervising the arrangement of psych testing for diaconal candidates as per OCA mandate.

#### Needs

- Travel to build up local programs.
- More dedicated hours for director (travel, office work, follow-up for diaconal and catechist candidates) It is possible that this could be done in conjunction with some other job, tasks, expanded/connected mandate.
- Better internet medium for conducting classes across distances.
- Way to fund students with limited means
- A procedure, similar to the diaconal, for vetting catechists (in particular, psych/background check)
- Arrangement of more faculty meetings for standardizing curriculum and building a cohesive diocesan institution.

- To set up Minneapolis and Cleveland programs and increase participation in Detroit Deanery. This should be arranged through visit of Director to meet with potential local faculty.
- Ways to certify "continuing ed" credits through Midwest CDV.
- Diocesan budgeting for psych testing for diaconal (catechist, too?) candidates.

**Proposals** (partly encouraged by discussion with some Deans and Bishop Alexander):

- To increase funding to program, to give the director (Fr. Elijah) at least one more day of paid work (doubling of present hours and payment). Would gladly take 2 more days!
- To fund scholarships for students
- To pay for better internet video connection
- To cover part of the costs for programming St. Andrew's House.

Some of these things could be partly funded by Diocese in conjunction with local class/ Deanery.

Director's Compensation (2012): Fr. Elijah has been paid for a day of work a week at the Diocesan center (\$500/month—see A below). Fr. Elijah's work is more than a day's work. Following the former direction of Bishop Matthias, we run payments for classes through the Diocese. This has meant that money goes in to the Diocese for a class, and then out to the instructor. This is done for transparency and to keep Diocesan records for a Diocesan class. Travel compensation is directed to be sent directly to the instructor. The instructors that have received diocesan compensation in this way are at present Fr. Elijah Mueller, Matushka Rebecca Luft and Eric Jobe (who both teach Old Testament) and Archdeacon Kirill for the Diaconal Practicum. (see B below) Instructors are all qualified with PhD, PhD candidates, or those who have completed doctoral courses and exams; or with significant work experience in academic theological teaching. In addition there was income and expenses from running the Diaconal Practicum at the beginning of January. The Bishop's Council voted to cover the travel expenses of the Diaconal Vocations Director. So far this has only been used to travel to Kansas City to do planning with the faculty group there.

#### Metropolitan Council Representative's Report - September 2013 Meeting

The first day of our time together was spent in a retreat given on the topic of "Conflict Resolution" on Monday, September 23rd by Dr. Al Rossi and Fr. Nicholas Solak. The presentations focused on the need to make everything that we do as members of the Council Christ-centered, and to make prayer the foundation of all deliberations: before, during, and after meetings. It was pointed out that often people suffer from the delusion of thinking that because they do "Church work" that by definition they are doing God's work, while this might be the farthest thing from the truth. We learned that conflict is inevitable and in a sense desirable as long as we deal with it in a non-destructive way. This non-destructive approach necessitates our making every effort to embody the healing presence of Christ in any given situation. This is a good message for us in all aspects of our life: both personal and ecclesial. We do well to take this message to heart whether we are serving on the Metropolitan Council, our parish council or even simply as members of the local parish.

With the near absence of controversy in the Church, in general the life of the OCA and in particular fall MC meetings were productive.

#### Good things reported at this fall meeting include:

- -Implementation of many elements of the Strategic plan adopted at the 16<sup>th</sup> AAC, most notably that of continuing clergy education and work with youth and young adults, utilizing social media;
- -Positive working relationships in the chancery and a high degree of productivity;
- -Better disposition of misconduct cases with the new head of ORSMA (Office for the reporting of sexual misconduct allegations);
- -Acceptance of Metropolitan Tikhon and the OCA by many world leaders of the Orthodox Church, and possibility of expanding our role and standing in the Assembly of Bishops in the U.S.;
- -Documentation of "much good work" being done in a host of departments and committees by the Work study group'
- -Enthusiastic head of Department of Evangelization, Fr. John Parker, working to implement a strategy for missionary work;

#### **Growth areas:**

- -Dealing with current staff shortages in the chancery due to illness and other resignations due to do changes in people's lives;
- -Deficit situation for 2013 due to shortfall in revenues and census figures;
- -More work needed in Financial development (i.e. OCA Stewards);
- -Changes with respect to the Orthodox Health Plan and health insurance issues in the U.S. generally speaking.

A deficit budget for 2014 was presented, but with some tweaking on the expense side and discussion regarding encouraging more activity with OCA Stewards, it was felt that we could anticipate the balance of that budget. OCA Stewards was rolled out at the February 2013 MC meeting and more than \$27k was raised from members of the council. It is hoped that this new stewardship effort of the Church with participation of clergy and laity of the OCA would help to secure some financial stability for our church. Please expect to hear more about this in the near future.

#### Things that presently or will affect us in the near future:

-Due to the drop in funding levels of the Pension plan to 83%, the Pension Board recommended that the MC ratify a restructure of the plan to include increase of contribution level of parishes for their clergy

from 6% to 8% of salary and housing, beginning in 2014. Clergy contributions will remain fixed at 6%. This infusion of cash will make the plan more stable and help us to achieve full funding within 15 years. This is a wonderful plan in that it continues to be a defined benefits (as opposed to defined contribution) plan. It is efficiently managed by professional managers—and by a very thoughtful pension board members, among whom are our own Fr. John Zdinak.

-The 18<sup>th</sup> AAC will take place in July of 2015, likely to be held in Atlanta, GA. An assessment for the council will come out in July of 2014, with levels commensurate with those of the 16<sup>th</sup> council. It will be good to anticipate this in your 2013 budgets.

-With the retirement of Archimandrite Alexander (Cutler) and Fr. Daniel to Ukraine, the future of St. John Monastery in Hiram is under discussion. According to the original conditions of the grantors of the Hiram property, in order for it to remain with the Diocese it must be used for church-related activities. If it does not, the grant has a "reversionary clause" that would see it returned to the family that donated it. I hope that it will be possible to do something that would see it continue in our diocese, or if not, at least with some Orthodox group.
