Registration

Hotels

Missions Meeting

All representatives from missions are requested to join the Missions Director, Archpriest Thomas Mueller, at a special Missions Meeting, to be held on Monday at 8:00 p.m. at the Crowne Plaza hotel. The volunteers at the Assembly Registration desk will direct you to the meeting room. Special Nominating Assembly

On Tuesday, we will begin with the Divine Liturgy, with His Grace, Bishop Alexander presiding. All are asked to sing congregationally under the direction of Mr. Philip Sokolov.

Clergy who will be asked to serve are requested to bring gold vestments. Priests who desire to receive communion should bring with them a gold stole and cuffs. Deacons who desire to receive communion may do so by vesting in gold orarion and cuffs. Priests are asked to wear both a black cassock and a black riassa along with their pectoral cross for the sessions; while other ranks of clergy are asked to wear a black cassock and black riassa (if appropriate) or just a black cassock during the sessions. Lay people are asked to dress conservatively at all services and sessions as is appropriate for Church occasions.

52ND ASSEMBLY OF THE DIOCESE OF THE MIDWEST

Lansing, Illinois 8 October 2013

PLENARY SESSION I

I. OPENING.

Following the celebration of the Divine Liturgy, at which His Grace, Bishop Alexander presided, the Assembly opened with the Invocation of the Holy Spirit at 10:37 a.m.

II. CREDENTIALS.

One Bishop, 49 clergy delegates, 42 lay delegates, and 4 observers, for a total of 96 participants.

III. INTRODUCTORY REMARKS, APPOINTMENTS.

Archpriest John Zdinak, Diocesan Chancellor, stated that the Diocesan Council had opined that, given the agenda, there is no need to elect clergy and lay chairs, and that if there is no objection, he will chair the sessions. All agreed. He reported, on behalf of the Diocesan Council, that Archpriest John Matusiak, Ann Marie Mecera, and Philip Sokolov are bring proposed to serve as the secretariat, and that Archpriest Thomas Mueller chair the Nominating Committee, the proposed members of which include Protodeacon Robert Northrup, Ruth Bedie, and Susan Lentz. Said candidates were elected upon motion by Archpriest Nicholas Wyslutsky, seconded by Sam D'Fantis.

He added that the delegates will be electing two clergy members and one lay member for the Diocesan Council and one member of the Auditing Committee. The deacons will serve as tellers for the elections.

Concerning a resolution submitted in advance by Saint John Church, Warren, OH, calling for the nomination of a ruling Bishop for the Diocese of the Midwest, he explained that said resolution is out of order, inasmuch as the *Statute* requires such nominations to be held at a special assembly convened for this purpose.

IV. BISHOP'S REPORT.

Bishop Alexander explained that the Holy Synod of Bishops desires to wait at least one year before addressing the issue of the nomination and election of a new ruling Hierarch for the Diocese. He expressed his hope that this Assembly be a peaceful and harmonious one, assuring everyone that as *Locum Tenens* he is available to assist in every possible manner.

He noted that there are a number of exciting things happening throughout the Diocese, such as the Late Vocations Program; urban ministries, especially the example provided by Detroit's Saints Peter and Paul Cathedral as a model for future efforts in the area of urban ministry; and other opportunities for ministry and service.

In reflecting on problems encountered in recent years, he assured everyone that the members of the Holy Synod have been acting, and will continue to act, in the best interest of the Church,

V. CHANCELLOR'S REPORT.

Father Zdinak presented a written report, which is available on the diocesan web site at http://domoca.org/files/52nd% 20ASSEMBLY/2013-chancellors-report.pdf. He also offered a number of updates.

- **A.** He expressed gratitude to His Grace, Bishop Longin and the clergy and faithful of Saint Archangel Michael Serbian Orthodox Church for the use of their facilities for the Assembly.
- **B.** He reminded everyone that, unless they are of a confidential nature, letters and e-mails should not be sent directly to Bishop Alexander, but to the Chancery, Chancellor and district Deans.
- C. He announced that Dennis Garlick will chair a committee to evaluate the Chancery facilities and related needs. This is critical in discerning future utilization of the property and anticipated maintenance expenses. For example, the estimated cost of tuckpointing is approximately \$126,000.00. It is hoped that the committee will be in place and fully functioning by the end of 2013.
- D. He highlighted the new parish report forms, which have been modeled after those used in the Diocese of the West.

VI. DEANERY REPORTS.

The Deans' reports stand as presented on pages 33 – 192 of the Assembly Report Book, which is available on the Diocesan web site at http://domoca.org/files/52nd%20ASSEMBLY/2013-delegate-handbook.pdf. The Deans had nothing to add to their written reports.

VII. ST. JOHN MONASTERY, HIRAM, OH REPORT.

Father Zdinak recounted recent events at the monastery, specifically the retirement of its Abbot, Archimandrite Alexander [Cutler], who together with Monk Daniel [Kidd] have relocated a monastery in Ukraine. He elaborated on the history of the property, which had been donated with the stipulation that, should it cease to be used for religious purposes, it would revert to the heirs of the original donors. After much consideration, monks from Holy Cross Monastery [ROCOR] in West Virginia relocated to Hiram, thereby establishing a *metochion* of their monastery. VIII. CATECHIST AND DIACONAL VOCATIONS PROGRAM REPORT.

Priest Elijah Mueller offered a written report, which is presented on pages 243–244 of the Assembly Report Book, to which he added that in all categories there are 34 students. It is anticipated that the soon-to-be initiated program in

Kansas City will increase this number considerably.

IX. METROPOLITAN COUNCIL REPRESENTATIVES' REPORT.

Archpriest Alexander Kuchta offered a written report, which is presented on pages 245-246 of the Assembly Report Book, to which he urged all parishes, when changing insurance carriers, retain old policies should questions arise in the future with regard to which insurance company may be responsible for a given claim.

X. TREASURER'S REPORT.

Rob Koncel presented the comprehensive report found on pages 193–238 of the Assembly Report Book. He noted that the Diocese realized a \$69,000.00 surplus in 2012, in part due to a number of reductions in expenses.

XI. AUDITORS' REPORT.

Auditors Judy Weinclaw, Sam Jacob and Frank Tkacz met in August and reviewed the relevant documents. They noted that, in their written report as presented on pages 239–241 of the Assembly Report Book, they had made a number of recommendations in an effort to streamline the auditing process. The report as presented was accepted upon motion by Kitty Mabus, seconded by Archpriest Andrew Nelko.

XII. 2014 BUDGET PRESENTATION.

Mr. Koncel presented the proposed 2014 budget as amended by the Diocesan Council, which is available on the diocesan web site at http://domoca.org/files/52nd%20ASSEMBLY/2014-budget-revised.pdf. The amendment involves raising the stipend for the Director of the Catechist and Diaconal Vocation Program from \$6,000.00 to \$12,000.00 per year and adding an additional \$6,000.00 for travel expenses, materials, and related necessities. Priest Nicholas Finley motioned, seconded by Archpriest David Lis, to accept the budget as amended. Motion passed unanimously.

Father Zdinak explained that the escrow shown in the financial report represents general surplus funds not related to the

Father Zdinak explained that the escrow shown in the financial report represents general surplus funds not related to the OCA escrow, which represents the amount the OCA has reduced its assessment, and that the latter is placed into a separate account and is not reflected in the financial report.

XIII. MINUTES OF THE 51ST ASSEMBLY.

Minutes of the 51st Diocesan Assembly, as found on pages 11–13 of the Assembly Report Book, were accepted as presented upon motion by Archpriest John Adamcio, seconded by Joseph Manczij.

A 15-minute break was granted at 11:57 a.m. in preparation for elections.

XIV. NOMINATIONS.

The session reconvened at 12:12 p.m.

After clarifying election procedures, Father Zdinak invited nominees – Archpriests Alexander Garklavs and John Adamcio; Priests Elijah Mueller and Matthew Moriak; Barry Gluntz and Daria Petrykowski – to address the delegates. Ballots were distributed and collected as the delegates broke for lunch.

PLENARY SESSION II

XV. CREDENTIALS, ELECTION RESULTS.

The session reconvened at 2:10 p.m. with one Bishop, 39 clergy delegates, 39 lay delegates, and 4 observers, for a total of 83 participants.

Election results were announced. Archpriest Alexander Garklavs, Priest Elijah Mueller, and Barry Gluntz were elected to the Diocesan Council, with Priest Matthew Moriak, Archpriest John Adamcio, and Daria Petrykowski serving as alternates. Judy Wienclaw was elected to serve as auditor by acclamation.

XVI. SOS PROJECT REPORT.

Kitty Mabus thanked parishes and individuals that responded to the August "Support Our Seminarians" appeal. To date, approximately \$13,000.00 had been received from 18 parishes and several individuals. Donations are still being accepted. Top donors were Saint Joseph, Wheaton, IL [\$2,160.00]; Protection of the Holy Virgin, Royalton, IL [\$1,965.00]; Saint Paul, Dayton, OH [\$1,950.00]; Saint Nicholas, Mogadore, OH [\$1,000.00]; and Holy Trinity, Overland Park, KS [\$712.00].

XVII. OTHER BUSINESS.

- A. Diocesan Center Property. In response to questions concerning the physical condition of the Diocesan Center, Father Zdinak referred to his written report and reviewed a number of improvements that had been made recently. He also presented a number of needs and concerns, including concerns expressed by the Diocesan Council with regard to contracting an outside contractor to appraise the property and identify and prioritize future needs. This study is all the more timely in light of the decrease in diocesan membership and concurrent decrease in income.
- **B.** Assessment Reduction. Gregory Malovance, lay delegate from Holy Resurrection Church, Palatine, IL, opened a discussion on assessments. He noted that the Diocese has accumulated money in an escrow account, with no indication of where that money needs to go, and that the OCA assessment for 2014 has been decreased. In light of this, he motioned that the per capita diocesan assessment for 2014 be reduced by \$15.00 per adult member. After discussion, he amended the motion to reduce the assessment by \$13.00 (to eliminate the OCA escrow), seconded by Father Kuchta. After considerable discussion, the motion was put to a vote, with 43 votes against, 28 in favor, and five abstentions

MEETING OF THE DIOCESAN COUNCIL OF THE DIOCESE OF THE MIDWEST

Lansing, Illinois • 7 October 2013

I. OPENING.

The meeting opened with the singing of the Lord's Prayer at 5:22 p.m.

II. ATTENDANCE.

Present were His Grace, Bishop Alexander; Archpriest John Zdinak, Chancellor; Archpriest John Matusiak, Secretary; Mr. Robert Koncel, Treasurer; Diocesan Council members Archpriest Alexander Kuchta, Priest Nicholas Finley, Sam D'Fantis, Dennis Garlick, Michael Herzak, Kitty Mabus, Ann Marie Mecera; Bishop's Council members Archpriests Ted Bobosh, Andrew Clements, Thomas Mueller, Timothy Sawchak, Paul Wesche, and Andrew Yavornitzky; and Philip Sokolov, Diocesan Chancery.

III. MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETINGS.

The minutes were accepted as presented upon motion by Dennis Garlick, seconded by Sam D'Fantis.

IV. CHANCELLOR'S REPORT.

- **A.** Father Zdinak announced that Father Mueller will chair the Nominations Committee. Members include Protodeacon Robert Northrup, Ruth Bedie, and Susan Lentz.
- **B.** The Assembly Secretariat includes Father Matusiak, Mr. Sokolov, and Mrs. Mecera.
- **C.** The deacons will oversee credentials.
- **D.** Instead of naming clergy and lay Assembly chairs, it was agreed that Father Zdinak will chair the sessions.
- **E.** Father Zdinak announced that Bishop Alexander will vest at 7:00 a.m. at the Divine Liturgy on Tuesday, 8 October. He also recognized the excellent cooperation received from His Grace, Bishop Longin and the rector and faithful of Saint Archangel Michael Church in providing the venue for the Assembly.
- **F.** In reviewing possible candidates for Diocesan Council elections, Father Zdinak noted that while Archpriests Christopher Wojcik and Stephen Hrycyniak and Michael Dorosh could run for second terms, they are ineligible due to the fact that they will not be attending the Assembly. Judy Wienclaw is eligible for reelection to another term as auditor.
- **G.** He noted that the parish report forms, modeled after those used in the Diocese of the West, were well received. The numbers reported by the parishes thereon serve as the 2014 diocesan census.
- **H.** He also offered an update on Saint John Monastery, Hiram, OH, which is in a state of transition.
- I. With regard to a resolution presented by Saint John Church, Warren, OH, calling for the election of Archpriest Paul Gassios as Bishop of Chicago and the Diocese of the Midwest, it was noted that doing so stands in conflict with the Statute, which calls for the convocation of a Special Assembly for said elections. Bishop Alexander offered his insights on the matter while emphasizing that no set, strict time-line had been established by the Diocese or the Holy Synod of Bishops.

V. TREASURER'S REPORT.

- **A.** Mr. Koncel presented the proposed 2014 budget and made a number of comments on specific items.
 - 1. Insurance deductible has been revised, resulting in savings. In the process of giving the diocesan car to His Grace, Bishop Matthias, we no longer need to pay that deductible.
 - 2. In response to a question concerning the "escrow" being collected on the assessment, it was noted that it had not been placed in a dedicated account. It was felt that it should be.
 - 3. After considerable discussion on increased funding for the Diaconal Vocations Program headed by Priest Elijah Mueller [and a related discussion on psychological testing of Program participants contemplating ordination], upon motion by Mr. Garlick, seconded by Father Finley, Council members voted unanimously to budget \$18,000.00 for the Program in 2014, reflecting a \$12,000.00 stipend for Father Elijah Mueller and \$6,000.00 for additional expenses.
- **B.** Mr. Koncel cautioned that, despite a \$43,000.00 surplus, expenses will increase when a new bishop is elected and installed.
- C. Upon motion by Ms. Mabus, seconded by Mrs. Mecera, Council members voted unanimously to present the proposed 2014 budget, as amended, to Assembly delegates.

VI. ADJOURNMENT.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 6:50 p.m. with the singing of "It Is Truly Meet."

MEETING OF THE DIOCESAN COUNCIL OF THE DIOCESE OF THE MIDWEST

Chicago, Illinois • 10 January 2014

I. OPENING.

The meeting opened with the singing of the Theophany Troparion led by His Grace, Bishop Alexander, at 10:10 a.m.

II. ATTENDANCE.

Present were Bishop Alexander; Archpriest John Zdinak, Chancellor; Archpriest John Matusiak, Secretary; Mr. Robert Koncel, Treasurer; Diocesan Council members Archpriests Alexander Garklavs and Basil Stoyka; Priests Nicholas Finley and Elijah Mueller; Mr. Samuel D'Fantis, Mr. Barry Gluntz, Mr. Michael Herzak, Jr., and Ms. Kitty Mabus; Bishop's Council members Archpriests Theodore Bobosh, Andrew Clements, Thomas Mueller, Timothy Sawchak, and Andrew Yavornitzky; and Mr. Philip Sokolov, Diocesan Chancery. Absent from the meeting were Archpriests Alexander Kuchta and Paul Wesche; Priest Nathan Kroll; Mr. Dennis Garlick; and Ms. Ann Marie Mecera.

The day's Epistle and Gospel readings were read by Mr. Gluntz and Father Garklavs, respectively, after which Bishop Alexander offered insights.

The minutes of the last Diocesan Council meeting and 2013 Diocesan Assembly were accepted as presented.

III. BISHOP ALEXANDER'S REPORT.

- **A.** Bishop Alexander shared his feelings and background concerning a successor to Bishop Matthias and reported on the Holy Synod's feeling in the matter.
- **B.** He reported on a number of parish visits as Locum Tenens.
- C. He further reported on the "splendid session" held in the Kansas City area at which he met the future instructors for the area's late vocations program, supervised by Priest Elijah Mueller. He also visited Saint Thomas Church, Springfield, MO, where he celebrated an ordination.

IV. CHANCELLOR'S REPORT.

- **A.** Father Zdinak apologized on behalf of the Chancery for delays in some check processing. Deposits will be made on a weekly basis.
- **B.** After brief discussion, it was decided that the 2014 Diocesan Assembly will be held in Cleveland during the first week of October.
- C. The Clergy Convocation will be held at the Carmelite Center, Darien, IL May 19-21, 2014.
- **D.** The Council continued discussions in executive session.

V. ADDITIONS TO DEANERY REPORTS.

- **A.** Chicago Deanery. Winter Youth Camp February will be held 15-17 February. Archpriest Peter Bodnar, Merrill-ville, IN, will be retiring in June. Holy Apostles Mission, Bloomington-Normal, IL, was granted parish status 9 January 2014.
- **B.** Cleveland Deanery. Saint Innocent Church, Olmstead Falls, OH, celebrated its 35th Anniversary. Holy Trinity Church, Parma, OH, celebrated its 50th Anniversary, while Saints Peter and Paul Church, Lorain, OH, celebrated its 100th Anniversary.
- C. Indianapolis Deanery. Archpriest Joseph Gibson will be retiring this year; his health continues to decline.
- **D. Kansas City Deanery.** Deacon Joel Wilson was ordained to the priesthood in December 2013 and was appointed priest-in-charge of the Misison in Rolla, MO. Archpriest Tom Succarrotte's health continues to deteriorate. The Deanery Late Vocations Program will be starting its 16-week course soon with 15 students enrolled.
- **E. Michigan Deanery.** It is hoped that Detroit's Saints Peter and Paul Cathedral will soon have an assigned priest. Priest Angelo Pepps has been given a blessing to initiate, on the part of the parish in Albion, MI, an outreach ministry aimed at establishing a community in Kalamazoo/Portage.
- **F. Minneapolis Deanery.** Christ the Savior Mission, Anoka, MN, has closed, while its priest-in-charge, Priest Gregory Grivna, has petitioned to retire. Holy Cross Mission, Chisago City, WI, also may be closing as membership has dwindled to a dozen souls. Holy Myrrhbearers Mission, St. Cloud, MN, almost closed. A Russian mission community in St. Paul, MN, is being pursued. The group purchased an unused Serbian Church, but has no assigned priest. Priest Nicholas Hubbard has returned to the Deanery and is preparing to enter the military chaplaincy.

VI. METROPOLITAN COUNCIL REPRESENTATIVES' REPORT.

In addition to the written report of Father Kuchta, who was absent, it was noted that the "Fellowship of Orthodox Stewards" is being revived with a new name. A three-week drive to subscribe 300 members will begin shortly.

VII. TREASURER'S REPORT.

- **A.** Mr. Koncel reported that we collected about \$8,000.00 less than the sum for which we budgeted, which for the most part is not bad compared to past years.
- **B.** With regard to program income for missions, the amount essentially reflects stock profits.
- C. In general, our financial situation is healthy, with a net income of \$64,000.00.
- **D.** It was noted that the procedure for income and disbursements with regard to the seminarian scholarships needs to be clarified.
- E. The Finance Committee motioned, seconded by Mr. D'Fantis, that Father Matusiak receive \$250.00 per month for

his work with the web site and communications, which he has done for many years gratis. The stipend will be retroactive to 1 January 2014. Motion passed unanimously.

F. Once the profit/loss statement for 2013 is completed, it will be sent out with the 2014 budget.

VIII. MISSION COMMITTEE REPORT.

- A. Since standard Diocesan Assembly reports for parishes and missions are now in place, missions will no longer need to submit additional reports. Instead of the stipends distributed in the past, missions will be encouraged to apply for Parish Development grants, due in August 2014. Grants will begin in the fall. A key concern is providing funding to Detroit's Saints Peter and Paul Cathedral for a pastoral salary.
- **B.** Funding also should be made available for the Chancellor to accompany deans in visiting prospective mission sites for an initial feasibility review.
- C. Bishop Alexander stated that he looks forward to a well organized approach to establishing missions, in line with what is happening in the Dioceses of the South and West, despite radical differences in demographics.

IX. FACILITY REVIEW.

- **A.** Father Zdinak reported that a committee has been formed, consisting of himself; Mr. Garlick, Chair; Priest John Baker, Property Manager; Mr. D'Fantis; and Mr. Barry Koncel, a member of Saints Peter and Paul Church, Burr Ridge, who has expertise in construction.
- **B.** The first thing on the committee's agenda is completing a detailed analysis of the property to discern what needs to be addressed immediately and what can wait.
- C. The new committee will need to work closely with the Finance Committee, especially with regard to the cost of any necessary structural work. The relationship with Christ the Savior parish also needs to be reviewed, as the parish enjoys the use of the facilities without charge.

X. LATE VOCATIONS.

It was noted that local deanery faculties, with educated clergy and lay persons qualified to teach, need to be developed. It was further emphasized that the program is not, first and foremost, limited to those pursuing ordination to the diaconate. Having met with great success in the Chicago Deanery, the present need is to how to initiate the program in all deaneries. A variety of other matters concerning training of instructors, syllabi, etc. were also reviewed.

XI. NEXT MEETING, ADJOURNMENT.

- **A.** The next meeting will be held 10-11 June, 2014 in Chicago.
- **B.** There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 2:24 p.m.

MEETING OF THE DIOCESAN COUNCIL OF THE DIOCESE OF THE MIDWEST

Chicago, Illinois • 11 June 2014

I. OPENING.

The meeting opened with prayer led by His Grace, Bishop Alexander, at 9:30 a.m.

II. ATTENDANCE.

Present were Bishop Alexander; Archpriest Paul Gassios; Archpriest John Zdinak, Chancellor; Mr. Robert Koncel, Treasurer; Archpriest John Matusiak, Secretary; Archpriests Theodore Bobosh, Andrew Clements, Alexander Garklavs, Alexander Kuchta, Thomas Mueller, Timothy Sawchak, Basil Stoyka, Paul Wesche; Priests Nicholas Finley, Nathan Kroll, and Elijah Mueller; Mr. Samuel D'Fantis, Mr. Dennis Garlick, Mr. Michael Herzak, Jr., Ms. Kitty Mabus; and Ms. Ann Marie Mecera; and Mr. Philip Sokolov, Diocesan Chancery. Absent were Archpriest Andrew Yavornitzky and Mr. Barry Gluntz.

The day's Epistle and Gospel readings were read by Fathers Zdinak and Gassios respectively, after which Bishop Alexander offered insights.

III. ACCEPTANCE OF JANUARY 2014 MINUTES.

The minutes of the last Diocesan Council meeting were accepted with corrections, which are reflected in the final approved set of minutes.

III. BISHOPALEXANDER'S REPORT.

- A. Bishop Alexander reviewed the situation between the Holy Synod of Bishops and Father Gassios' appointment as Diocesan Administrator, which becomes effective 1 August 2014. He shared his hope that the nomination for a new diocesan bishop would be conducted at the forthcoming special Diocesan Assembly, to be held in conjunction with the regular Assembly to be held in Cleveland in October 2014.
- **B.** He noted that Father Gassios had been a candidate in the last nomination, having been one of three candidates put forward by the search committee, and that he had been vetted twice, by two different dioceses.
- **C.** He reported on pastoral visitations to Wheaton, IL [25th Anniversary], Broadview Heights, OH [Archpriest John Memorich's 25th anniversary of ordination]; Bloomington-Normal, IL; and Green Bay, WI.

IV. CHANCELLOR'S REPORT.

- **A.** Father Zdinak announced that the Diocesan Assembly will be held in Cleveland October 6-7, 2014. The Diocesan Council tentatively will meet at noon on October 6. Sessions will be held at Archangel Michael Church, Broadview Heights, OH. It is uncertain as to whether the electoral Assembly will be held before or after the regular Assembly.
- **B.** This year's clergy convocation was cancelled due to low registration, but will continue in the future as it provides an excellent forum for our clergy to gether.
- C. With several retirements pending between now and the end of the year, there will be openings in several parishes.
- **D.** He reported on the Finance Committee meeting, held on the preceding evening. Among the items considered by the committee was a compensation package for the Diocesan Administrator. On behalf of the Committee, Father moved that the compensation package be set at \$24,000.00 per year cash salary, with the set value of the apartment set at \$18,000.00; \$5,880.00 pension; and 15.3% FICA, or \$6,426.00. The target cost for health insurance is \$12,000.00. [The OCA plan is \$13,500.00.] The package total stands at \$48,306.00. In instituting this, Father Zdinak's salary will be decreased by one-third. The motion passed unanimously.
- E. Father Zdinak led Council members in an executive session.

V. ADDITIONS TO DEANERY REPORTS.

- **A.** Chicago Deanery. Archpriests Peter Bodnar and Myron Manzuk are slated to retire. Priest Andrew Bartek was transferred from Joliet, IL to Summit, IL. Saint Matthew Church, Green Bay, WI purchased a new church building a major step for the community. Priest Elijah Mueller received his doctorate from Marquette University. The annual summer camp went well.
- **B.** Cleveland Deanery. Father Stoyka has been given the blessing to retire 1 January 2015.
- **C. Indianapolis Deanery.** No additions.
- **D. Kansas City Deanery.** Father Sawchak visited Saint Raphael Mission, Quincy, IL, with Father Zdinak, from which Priest Thaddeus Nielsen retired in October 2013. The community is small and needs to come together in a cohesive manner
- E. Michigan Deanery. A resident priest is being sought for Detroit's Saints Peter and Paul Cathedral.
- F. Minneapolis Deanery. As an update on Saint Nicholas Church, Chisholm, MN, Father Wesche reported that the parties involved in Chisholm have been permitted to obtain 501c3 status. The services of Minneapolis attorney Simeon Morbey have been retained in this matter, and the Diocese will hand over the property to the parties in Chisholm under specific conditions and a reversionary clause for ecclesiastical purposes only, stipulating that if the parties are no longer able to maintain the property, it will revert to the Diocese for further action. The mission in Chisago City will close at the end of the summer. Father Wesche explained the financial situation of the mission, which has a bank account of approximately \$100,000.00 and land worth \$50,000.00 \$100,000.00.

Holy Myrrhbearers', St. Cloud, MN remains a chapel attached to Minneapolis' Saint Herman Church, while Archpriest Vladimir Lecko will no longer serve in Minocqua due to health.

VI. METROPOLITAN COUNCIL REPRESENTATIVES' REPORT.

Father Kuchta stated that there was nothing to add to his written report.

VII. MISSION REPORT.

- **A.** Father Thomas Mueller noted that he would like to reinstate the Parish Development Grant program.
- **B.** A Small Parish Forum will be held in Byesville, OH. The Midwest Diocese, which is cosponsoring the event with the Diocese of Pittsburgh and Western Pennsylvania, committed \$5,000.00 to the project.

VIII. LATE VOCATIONS PROGRAM REPORT.

- A. Father Elijah Mueller spoke of the program in the Kansas City area, which has attracted 12 students.
- **B.** Several individuals who have completed the program have been ordained to the diaconate.
- C. Detroit's Saint Andrew House will be the site of a conference August 8-9 at which Bishop Alexander and Father Gassios will be present.

IX. TREASURER'S REPORT.

- A. Mr. Koncel reported that salary information on the Profit and Loss statements have been broken down.
- **B.** The Development Fund is up by \$10,000.00 thus far in 2014, while the Operating Reserve Fund is up by \$74,593.30 due to the deposit of the escrow. The Maintenance Reserve Fund will be reduced due to chimney and roof repairs for Christ the Savior Church.
- **C.** Father Zdinak added that the Finance Committee will be meeting well before the next Dicoesan Council meeting to develop a plan with regard to escrow funds and expenses for the bishop.
- **D.** With regard to seminarian grants, they will be distributed only to those seminarians who submit applications and other requested documentation by the stated deadline, thereby eliminating the issue of unclaimed funds.

X. NEW BUSINESS.

- A. Father Zdinak announced that Bishop Alexander has called for the convening of a special Assembly at which a nominee for the position of diocesan bishop would be determined. After considerable discussion, Ms. Mabus, seconded by Father Matusiak, motioned that the Diocesan Council endorse Bishop Alexander's request to convene a Special Assembly in conjunction with the October 2014 regular Assembly. After brief discussion and clarification, the motion passed unanimously.
- **B.** Father Elijah Mueller moved, seconded by Father Kuchta, that the Diocesan Council endorse Father Gassios as its candidate for diocesan bishop. Motion passed with two absentions [Mr. Garlick and Ms. Mabus] and no opposition votes.

XI. NEXT MEETING, ADJOURNMENT.

- **A.** Upcoming meetings include those to be held 6 October 2014 in conjunction with the Diocesan Assembly and 16-17 December 2014 in Chicago.
- **B.** There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned upon motion by Ms. Mabus, seconded by Mr. Garlick, at 1:50 p.m.

Procedure for the Nomination of an Episcopal Candidate for the Diocese of the Midwest

In accordance with Article VI, Section 8 of *The Statute of the Orthodox Church in America*, it has been announced that His Grace, Bishop Alexander will convene a Special Assembly of the Diocese of the Midwest on the morning of Tuesday, October 7, 2014 at Archangel Michael Church in Broadview Heights, OH. The sole purpose of this Assembly shall be the nomination of a candidate for the vacant See of Chicago and the Midwest.

As stated in Article VI, Section 10 of the Statute:

The election of the diocesan bishop shall proceed as follows:

- **a.** The Diocesan Assembly shall nominate a candidate and submit his name to the Holy Synod;
- **b.** If the Assembly falls [sic] to nominate a candidate acceptable to the Holy Synod, the Synod shall elect the bishop of the diocese;
- **c.** Upon the approval of a candidate by the Holy Synod, he shall be summoned to a session of the Holy Synod for the canonical election.

His Grace, Bishop Alexander, has presented for our consideration the candidacy of the Very Reverend Archpriest Paul Gassios. The Bishop's Council and Diocesan Council of the Midwest have also endorsed Fr. Paul as their candidate. Fr. Paul has been vetted by the Holy Synod of Bishops of the Orthodox Church in America, as well as by two different dioceses as part of their search processes—including our own, four years ago.

Let it be understood that Fr. Paul is not the only eligible nominee. The Holy Synod has provided us with a list of names of vetted candidates. This list is available to any Rector, Superior, or Priest-in-Charge in the Diocese of the Midwest by calling the Chancellor, Archpriest John Zdinak, at (216) 554-7282.

Indeed, delegates may cast their votes for any name—vetted or unvetted—as long as the nominee fulfills the qualifications outlined in Article VI, Section 9 of the

Statute, i.e., a monastic, celibate, or widowed clergyman or layman, or a bishop who is not already a Diocesan bishop.

If any delegate intends to vote for a candidate other than the candidate presented by Bishop Alexander, the delegate should consider that it would be prudent to contact the candidate to see if they would be amenable to this nomination.

The Diocesan Assembly does not, in fact, conduct the election of a bishop. This is the *nomination* of a *candidate* to *present* to the Holy Synod for canonical election to the See of Chicago and the Midwest. As outlined in the *Statute*, the Holy Synod may or may not elect the candidate the Diocese presents—vetted or unvetted.

The voting will take place according to the following procedure. At the conclusion of the Divine Liturgy and the appointed prayers, the delegates will take their seats in the pews. Observers will take their place in a designated area set apart. There will be no nominations heard from the floor, but rather, after a brief verbal reiteration of the procedure here printed, the vote will be taken.

On the first vote:

- **1.** A blank ballot will be issued to each registered delegate.
- 2. Each delegate will write the name of a **single** candidate on his ballot.
- **3.** The tellers will collect and tally the ballots.
- **4.** If a candidate receives a $\frac{2}{3}$ majority of the vote, the chair will ask for a motion of acclamation by the Assembly for the majority candidate.
- **5.** If, however, no candidate receives a $\frac{2}{3}$ majority of the vote, a second, "runoff" vote will be held between the two candidates who received the most votes.

On the second vote:

- **1.** Again ballots will be issued.
- **2.** Again each delegate will write a **single** name—the name of one of the two remaining candidates.
- **3.** Again the tellers will collect and tally the ballots.
- **4.** Following the tally, the chair will announce the simple majority nominee and ask for a motion of acclamation by the Assembly for the majority candidate.

Any ballot containing two or more names will be disqualified.

DIOCESE OF THE MIDWEST

Diocesan Bylaws

(Approved 1996)

- I. The Diocese of the Midwest (hereinafter referred to as Diocese) is comprised of faithful Orthodox Christians united in local worshipping communities (hereinafter referred to as Parishes) within the territory assigned to it by the Holy Synod of Bishops of the Orthodox Church in America. It is a non-profit corporation chartered under the laws of the State of Illinois.
 - A. The Corporate Officers shall be: Diocesan Bishop as President, Chancellor as Vice President, Diocesan Secretary as Secretary, and Diocesan Treasurer as Treasurer.
 - B. A candidate for Bishop is nominated, elected, consecrated and/or installed as described in the Statue of the Orthodox Church in America (OCA), Article VI, Sections 9-11. The Diocesan Chancellor, Secretary, and Treasurer are appointed by the Bishop, as described in the Statute of the OCA, Article VI, Section 4, part 1. (Also see Article VIII, Section 6.)
 - C. The Bishop shall preside at the Diocesan Assembly and at the Diocesan Council meetings. The Bishop may appoint Vice Chair(s) at Diocesan Assemblies and Diocesan Council meetings.
 - D. The Bishop is the keeper of the corporate seal.
 - E. The Chancellor shall act as a liaison between the Diocesan Bishop and deans, clergy, parishes and Diocesan departments and committees. He is responsible for implementing the decisions of the Bishop, Diocesan Assemblies, Council, Bishop's Council, and any departments and committees. He will co-ordinate overall operation of the Chancery office and together with the Bishop be responsible for administration of the Diocese and its concerns.
 - F. The Secretary shall be responsible for:
 - 1. Keeping an accurate record of all Diocesan Council meetings and all Diocesan Assembles:
 - 2. The notification of all parishes of all such meetings;
 - 3. Performing such other duties as may be assigned by the Diocesan Bishop, Bylaw, and decision of the Diocesan Assembly or Council.
 - G. The Treasurer shall be responsible for:
 - 1. Overseeing the receipt, safekeeping, and proper disbursement of all money and other property of the Diocese entrusted into his care, according to the direction of the Diocesan Assembly or Diocesan Council;
 - 2. Providing a financial statement at the Diocesan Assembly and at such other times as may be requested by the Diocesan Council. The annual financial statement shall be audited and certified as provided in the Rules of Procedure;
 - 3. Having a complete account of the finances of the Diocese on books which shall be and remain the property of the Diocese;
 - 4. Such other duties as may be assigned by the Bishop, Bylaws, Rules of Procedure, and decision of the Diocesan Assembly or Council.

- H. The execution of contracts, not included in the Diocesan Operating budget, and authorized by the Diocesan Council may be accomplished with the signature of one of the following: The Bishop, Chancellor, Treasurer, or Secretary.
- I. The establishment of financial accounts and payment of funds may be accomplished with no less than two signatures of the following: The Bishop, Chancellor, Treasurer, or Secretary.
- II. The Annual Diocesan Assembly is the annual corporate meeting. It is held on the first Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday in October and conducted in accordance with the provisions of the Statue of the Orthodox Church in America. (See Appendix No. 1.) The time of the Assembly may be changed for cause by the Bishop or Diocesan Council, with thirty (30) day notice to Diocesan Parishes and Clergy. Extraordinary Assemblies may be convoked as described in the Statute of the OCA, Article VII, Section 4. The Diocesan Assembly shall elect:
 - A. One (1) Clergy Vice Chairman and one (1) Lay Vice Chairman.
 - B. Diocesan Council Representatives:
 - 1. There shall be ten (10) people, [five (5) clergy and five (5) lay elected atlarge]. Each year at the annual Diocesan Assembly, two (2) clergy and two (2) lay representatives will be elected. A term in office on the Diocesan Council is three (3) years.
 - 2. The length of consecutive service as an elected member of the Diocesan Council is six (6) years. A one (1) year sabbatical is required before running again for election to the Diocesan Council.
 - C. Diocesan Representatives to the Metropolitan Council:
 - 1. There shall be two (2) representatives, one (1) clergy and one (1) lay, elected at the Diocesan Assembly. These representatives shall be elected at the Diocesan Assembly their three-year terms being staggered. Representatives to the Metropolitan Council are members of the Diocesan Council ex officio. The term of newly elected representatives shall begin with the first Metropolitan Council meeting of the new calendar year.
 - D. Auditing Committee:
 - 1. The Auditing Committee shall consist of three (3) members elected at-large for a three (3) year term. One member shall be elected at the annual Diocesan Assembly each year.
 - 2. The senior member (the person in the final year of his term) shall be the Chairman.
 - 3. The Auditing Committee shall review the financial operations of the Diocese and make a written report to the Diocesan Assembly; this report shall be mailed to the parishes (30) days prior to the annual Diocesan Assembly.
 - E. Advisory committees may be established by the Bishop or by the Diocesan Council with the Bishop's approval as deemed necessary.
 - F. Assistants to the Secretary and Treasurer. If it is deemed necessary to have

- assistants to the Secretary or the Treasurer, the Bishop shall appoint such persons as needed.
- G. The clergy and lay person receiving the next highest number of votes after vacancies on the Council have been filled are considered to be alternates who would fulfill the remainder of a vacant term of a Diocesan Council member or Diocesan Representative to the Metropolitan Council. In case of need, the Bishop may also appoint a temporary replacement until the next Diocesan Assembly.
- H. The Diocesan Assembly shall establish the fiscal year and annual Diocesan assessment. (cf. Statute of the OCA, Article VII, Sec. 3, d.)
- I. Removal from the Diocesan Council
 - 1. All Diocesan Council members must continue to fulfill the qualifications for membership in the Council, as mandated by the Diocesan Assembly, during their entire tenure of office. Members of the Council whose membership status in a Diocesan parish changes due to Sacramental participation, etc. are subject to removal.
 - 2. Council members whose parish membership changes because of a move outside the boundaries of their parish and the Diocese must resign their position.
 - 3. Three (3) absences from Diocesan Council meetings between Diocesan Assemblies may be considered a resignation from the Diocesan Council.
 - 4. All actions regarding removal are subject to the final decision of the Diocesan Bishop.
- J. A Nominating Committee of three (3) members shall be selected by the Diocesan Council. The members of the Committee are not to be candidates for election.
- K. The duties of the Nominating Committee shall be:
 - 1. To compile a list of candidates nominated by members of the Assembly prior to the election session;
 - 2. To maximize the number of candidates running for open positions;
 - 3. Not to endorse or recommend any candidate for election.
- L. Nominations from the floor shall be accepted. Voting is by secret ballot.
- M. One must be an accredited delegate of and present at the Diocesan Assembly to be nominated.
- N. All parishes are required to meet the financial obligations for the Diocesan Assembly (i.e., registration fees) for a minimum of one (1) clergy and one (1) lay delegate.
- O. All parishes are required to be current with their Central Annual and Diocesan Annual Assessments in order to have delegates seated at the Annual Diocesan Assembly.
- III. The Diocesan Council is the corporate board of Directors. The Diocesan Council shall be composed of:
 - A. Voting members:
 - 1. Ruling Bishop and any Auxiliary Bishops;

- 2. Diocesan Chancellor;
- 3. Diocesan Secretary;
- 4. Diocesan Treasurer;
- 5. Five (5) clergy (Priests and/or Deacons) and five (5) laity;
- 6. Representatives to the Metropolitan Council [one (1) clergy and one (1) lay].
- B. Non-Voting members:
 - 1. Deans:
 - 2. Editor of The Vigil;
 - 3. Department and committee chairmen
- C. The Bishop (and any Auxiliaries) and the Chancellor are "Ex-officio" voting members of the Council.
- IV. In the event of any conflicting provisions, the corporation and Statue of the Orthodox Church in America shall take precedence over those of the Diocese. The corporation and Bylaws of the Diocese shall take precedence over that of the parishes.
- V. If the Diocese is dissolved or ceases to exist, all assets held in the name of the Diocese shall become the property of the Orthodox Church in America.
- VI. These Bylaws can be amended by a two-third (2/3) vote at a Diocesan Assembly with the proviso that the exact text of any proposed amendment be mailed with the approval of the Bishop to all parishes for distribution to their members at least 30 days prior to the meeting.

Appendix No. 1 – The Statute of the Orthodox Church in America

These bylaws were approved at the 36th Diocesan Assembly of the Diocese of the Midwest in Dayton, Ohio held October 7-9, 1996.

REPORT OF THE ADMINISTRATOR 53rd DIOCESAN ASSEMBLY Broadview Heights, Ohio October 6th and 7th, 2014

I wanted to report to you on my activities since I began actually serving as the Administrator of the Diocese on August 1st of this year.

First of all, every Sunday since August 1st has been filled with parish visitations either in the Chicago area or out of state. During the week, I have also made visitations on occasions when a Great Feast has been held or a Major Saint Day, or if I have been invited to a parish to just meet with me during the week. I have found all the visits to be quite enjoyable and I am quite impressed with the clergy of the diocese, their hard work and dedication, and the warmth and friendliness I have been greeted with on the part of members of all parishes I have visited.

I have also have been able to meet with many of the clergy of our diocese through deanery meetings. I have met with the dean of the Michigan Deanery, the Indianapolis Deanery, the Cleveland Deanery, Chicago Deanery, and Minneapolis Deanery. Unfortunately, I have yet to meet with the Kansas City Deanery due to scheduling problems. For those clergy I have not met, I have contacted by phone to introduce myself to them. I may not get to everyone by the assembly and for that I do apologize.

By virtue of being here at the chancery, it has given me the opportunity to facilitate a number of correspondences that needed to be written regarding releases, transfers, or assignment/attachment of clergy to various parishes and discussion of clergy assignments in general. This has involved having regular communication with the deans, chancellor, our diocesan secretary, and His Grace Bishop Alexander to facilitate the dissemination of this information in a proper and timely manner. It has been a real pleasure in being able to work with everyone in these matters. I am appreciative of their patience with me as I continue to learn what my duties are, and most importantly to just listen to others right now. I can see where being here to handle these daily tasks has been of help to those that were perhaps waiting quite a while for action to be taken in some of the above areas.

Finally, I spent two and a half weeks in August preparing Daily Logs to introduce myself to the rectors, and priests-in-charge of the diocese. I left it up to their discretion if they wanted to make this information available to their parishioners. My intent was to share with you who I am to help you make a prayerful decision on who you desire to nominate at the special assembly; as I am the main candidate that is being presented by His Grace Bishop Alexander for nomination.

I am unable to address the need for clergy awards to be presented at parish visitation. I apologize for those who have been waiting for this to happen. I ask for your patience in this area. Depending on what happens at the Assembly, hopefully we can make some progress in rectifying this.

We also have three or four people who are getting very close to petitioning to be ordained to the diaconate. Once again what happens on October 7th could have an impact on whether this will happen sooner or later.

At the time of this writing I actually don't know what is going to happen on October 7th; so it is difficult for me to look beyond that date. There are two things I can conclude though based on my time here so far. One is that this is not the same diocese I left in 2007 when I went to serve St. George Orthodox Cathedral in the Bulgarian Diocese. Secondly I need to do a lot of listening to all of you and learn from you in order to better understand the current dynamics of the Midwest. This is in order for me to know how to best oversee the life of the diocese if I do end up becoming your bishop.

We will see what happens...

TRANSITIONS

Father Peter Bodnar retired in June, creating a vacancy at Protection of the Virgin Mary in Merrillville, IN. Father Fred Janecek has served continuously as a supply priest on Saturdays and Sundays since that time. We are still seeking a permanent rector for the parish. Father Myron Manzuk retired as well, completing his service at St Panteleimon in Summit, IL. at the end of July. Father Andrew Bartek transferred from St Nicholas in Joliet, IL. to St. Panteleimon effective August 1st. This leaves a vacancy at St Nicholas, where Fr. Luke Nelson has been serving regularly since July. We are very grateful to both of these supply priests for the excellent service they have rendered, traveling very long distances each week to provide pastoral care for the Merrillville and Joliet parishes. Fr Luke also provides continual in-home care for his wife who is in poor health. Please remember Matushka Miriam in prayer, as well as those who been widowed in recent years, Matushka Vera Mironowicz and Fr John Kuchta. I know from experience how grievous and unrelenting this experience is.

We thank Fr Peter Bodnar and Fr Myron Manzuk for their long and dedicated service and pray that God grant them and their families "Many Years"!

LENTEN VESPERS

The homily theme for the Sunday Vespers was "Death in the Gospel." Homilists were Reader Daniel Manzuk, and Fathers John Adamcio, Maximus Cabey, Fred Janecek, and Thomas Mueller. The services and fellowship meals were hosted by St. Luke in Palos Hills, Holy Resurrection in Palatine, St Joseph in Wheaton, SS Cyril & Methodius in Milwaukee, and Holy Trinity Cathedral. We continue to keep the local tradition of Sunday Lenten services, which help to foster a bond of mutual love and support among our parishes, and we stress the importance of broad participation in them.

DEANERY MEETINGS

These take place on a bimonthly basis from September through June at various parishes. They include discussion of the lessons for the coming Sunday and a sharing of ideas on some issue or topic of concern as well as a 45 minute review of current business, concluding with lunch. Again we stress the importance of this presbyteral fellowship and seeking common cause rather than parochial introversion

YOUTH CAMPS

Once again we sponsored winter and summer camps at the excellent Edwards YMCA Camp facility near East Troy in Southeastern Wisconsin. Both camp periods included a Sunday, and so we bussed to Holy Theophany Chapel at William's Bay (Lake Geneva) for Liturgy and lunch, provided by the Chapel. Holy Theophany also paid for a boat cruise of Geneva Lake for our summer campers. The camps afford a wide range of outdoor activities (swimming, boating, 'banana boat', tower climbing, ropes course, campfires, tube slide in summer and winter, archery, hiking, marsh walk, nature museum, arts and crafts, skiing, sledding, and skating); we provide services, prayer, and religious education. This summer we broke up into small groups based on age - to study, think about, and discuss one of four different Gospel events. Each group then produced art representing their Gospel account (which will be on display at our Lenten Vespers services) and made an interpretative presentation to the whole group incorporating those art materials. Parishes sending youth included those in Wheaton, Milwaukee, Kenosha, Joliet, Burr Ridge, and Chicago (St. Macarius, Holy Trinity, Christ the Savior). We thanks our counselors: Pat Labun, Helen Metanchuk, Julia Pietrowski (St Joseph); & Adela Raicu, Fr Tom Mueller, Daria Mueller, Andy Haug, Brandon Redmann, and Protodeacon George Potym (SS Cyril & Methodius) for their work devotion, and care. We also thank Holy Theophany Chapel for hosting us, providing meals and activities, and sponsoring campers financially. The camps are under the direction of the dean.

The Deanery continues to provide small scholarships to deanery seminary students.

Highlights of Top Three Activities

- 1. On May 2-4, we were blessed by the visit of the Miracle-working Icon of Saint Anna, brought here by Igumen Sergius, Abbot of Saint Tikhon's Monastery. Father Sergius gave a richly edifying retreat, the Akathistos was sung, a procession was made, and hundreds of parishioners and visitors were graced by venerating the blessed icon and by being anointed with precious myrrh from her. This was truly one of the most enriching and reinvigorating experiences in the life of our parish.
- 2. This past month, Father Theodore Jurewicz arrived to complete the Icon of Christ in Hades. This icon, the largest of all the work in the church, resides in the area which once was home to a large pipe organ. The icon was donated by faithful throughout the diocese in memory of Archbishop Job, who founded the parish in August 1997 and initiated the iconography project in November of 2008. While Archbishop Job lived only to see two of the icons adorn the temple, we look forward to the completion of the project in 2015 and give thanks to God for the continued support of the faithful of our parish and of the diocese as we continue to do our best to bring to fruition the vision that Archbishop Job had for Christ the Savior Church.
- 3. In conjunction with Ancient Faith Ministries, the Divine Liturgy will be streamed live on Ancient Faith Radio every Sunday, live from our parish, beginning October 5, 2014.

Outreach and Charitable Activities

- 1. Continuing our commitment to build fellowship between our parish and the residents of the Little Village neighborhood, three major events took place since last year. First was a game night with the teens of the neighborhood. Next, we provided a Thanksgiving meal to residents of the neighborhood. More than 100 people gathered at St Agnes Catholic Church Hall, located in the neighborhood, to partake of a traditional Thanksgiving dinner. While a meal was provided, fellowship and relationships were the theme of the evening with over 20 parishioners from our parish not only serving, but mingling, talking, and laughing with the residents of the neighborhood. Games were played with the teens and crafts were done with the children. The most powerful and moving experience, however, came in July as Father John and faithful from the parish participated in a march for peace in the Little Village neighborhood. Carrying icons, we processed for three hours through the gang ridden territories of Little Village and Pilsen neighborhoods singing hymns, reading from the Holy Gospels and offering prayers with residents. Many of the participants were mothers whose sons were murdered at the various sites along the path where we stopped to pray. At these sites, Father John offered words of encouragement to the suffering and called upon the bystanders along the route, many of them gang members, to end the bloodshed and to be a source of peace, not terror, to the community in which they live. Our presence at this march and the willingness to share in the suffering of the people gathered during this march was appreciated by the residents and furthered their trust in us as a parish community while making evident our dedication to the people of Little Village.
- 2. Annual Taqueria Festival Fundraiser to benefit the Hogar Rafael Ayau Orphanage in Guatemala.
- 3. A percentage of our operating budget continues to go to our "parish tithe." Preference is given, but not limited to local recipients who this past year included: having water turned back on in a home for a single mother with two children; Providing funds for state ID and birth certificate to an ex-felon to help him obtain employment; paying a months rent for a woman who was facing eviction.
- 4. Active prison ministry at local federal prison, Metropolitan Correctional Facility.
- 5. Seminarian support for 3 parishioners attending St Tikhon's Seminary.

Major Challenges Faced

- 1. Transient nature of living in Chicago. There are only 2 individuals from the parish who were at CTS 10 years ago.
- 2. Busy urban living affects participation in Feasts of Church.
- 3. Roughly 20% of parishioners carry 90% of operating budget.
- 4. Lack of parking.
- 5. Lack of meeting space for fellowship and church school.
- 6. Funds needed to purchase van or small bus to bring teens from Little Village to church.

Several of our parishioners founded this OCF and two of them serve as President and Treasurer. The UWM OCF hosted a very beautiful and moving lecture and slide show by Wisconsin iconographer David Giffey in March. This program attracted a considerable number of non-Orthodox. Both OCF groups assist with the homeless shelter work.

Active participation in Milwaukee Innercity Congregations Allied for Hope – work on urban education and public transportation issues. Participation in regular prayer vigils at homicide sites.

Beginning last summer, the parish has sponsored English as Second Language classes for Mexican-American neighbors and for a few of our own Ethiopian immigrant members. The spring session was taught by one of our new converts, Fr Tom's son-in-law, Said Hamideh.

We participate actively in pan-Orthodox activities. Fr Tom has been serving as President of the local clergy group. This group sponsors an annual Youth Day, drawing about 100 parents and kids from Metro Milwaukee parishes. 

Highlights of Top Three Activities

- 1. Parish celebrated its 25th Anniversary in May 2014. Metropolitan Tikhon and Bishop Alexander were present for Saturday Great Vespers and Sunday Liturgy. A banquet followed the Divine Liturgy. A parish photo directory featuring pictures of over 600 adults and children was published in conjunction with the event.
- 2. Unpredictable expenses from the winter of 2013-2014, specifically plowing and salting, heating bills, replacement of numerous plants and shrubs lost due to snow and salt, etc., totaled nearly \$20,000.00 from October 2013 through mid-2014. These expenses had not been and could not be budgeted for.
- 3. At the request of parish teens, a special beginner iconography class will start in November just for them. An adult beginner class met on weekdays during the summer and was quite successful. Some of the iconography class "graduates" assist in iconography projects around the parish. Work on the iconostasis continues as time permits.

Outreach and Charitable Activities

- 1. While several families have retired or had job transfers, leading them to move out of state, new faces have appeared during the past year, many through conversion.
- 2. Monthly parish charities collections continue to assist our parishioners who are experiencing financial difficulties. During the past year some \$20,000.00 had been distributed to needy members of the parish.
- 3. We continue to attract individuals from other countries, including Iraq and Syria. Amongst the substantial Polish immigrant community, there are many newcomers, mostly young professionals who speak English. Most recently, we have had a number of families from the former Soviet Republic of Moldova attending services, most of whom will probably become members. Not all of the Moldovans speak English, however
- 4. Outreach to students from Wheaton College and other institutions continues. An average of 6 college students are received into the Church each year.
- 5. Two of our parishioners, Mike and Diane Oravecz, participated in an OCMC sponsored mission trip to Kenya, where they helped to build a church in a village.

Major Challenges Faced

- 1. Ever-present threat of flooding in the basement. We have been flooded out five times between 2002 and 2013. Unusually heavy rainstorms have been plentiful since then, but the church has not been effected, in part due to precautions we have taken to ensure minimal flooding in the future and in part due to upgrading of the neighborhood's antiquated sewer system several months ago. We are confident that with these precautions, we will not experience additional flooding.
- 2. We are presently in the process of consolidating the mortgages on the church and hall at a lower rate of interest.
- 3. Paying down the aforementioned unexpected expenses encountered during the winter of 2013-2014.
- 4. Space is always a consideration, especially during the school year.



Highlights of Top Three Activities

At this time we have a low number of children of Church School age. We began a Christian Education program last year, aimed at assisting the parents to educate their children in the Faith at home. We meet with the parents and children monthly to reinforce the study plan that has been developed for that period. This has received acceptable results and we hope that it will continue to improve and grow.

Our current adult education program is called "Faith Enrichment" it is conducted on Thursday mornings and has about 18 current participants. The study sessions are led by Subdeacon Leon Felon and Reader Paul Pangrace. In addition to the education aspect of the sessions it also offers a wonderful opportunity for fellowship with the participants.

Outreach and Charitable Activities

St. Theodosius participates in the are food bank with Merrick House, an established community outreach group in the Tremont area for many years.

We also participate in their annual Angel Tree gifts for needy children during the Christmas Season.

In addition we continue a monthly special offerings for: ST. Herman's House, a local ministry of Focus North America, St. Mary of Egypt, St. John Monastery in Hiram, IOCC, and many other local charities

Major Challenges Faced

The major challenge for our parish is our location. We are located on the South side of downtown Cleveland. The Greater Cleveland area has 35+ Orthodox Parishes, 6 of them are OCA Parishes. Most younger people with families move to and reside in the suburbs of Cleveland. We have, however, in spite of the natural attrition of an older parish, been able to maintain a steady membership. Many of the people who find our parish, or the Orthodox faith in our parish, are older and have no children living with them. Our Church School is not large in number as a result of this.

The second large challenge is the maintenance of a building that is 100+ years old. The Cathedral is always in need of repair and maintenance in one are or another. The utilities are high because of the age and construction of the temple. Insurance on the building is large because of the beauty and design of the building that would require a high replacement cost.

St. Theodosius own and operates the largest Orthodox Cemetery in the Greater Cleveland area (30 acres). The cemetery was founded at the beginning of the last century 1900. The cemetery employs two full-time employees and 3-4 seasonal employees. The Church secretary also functions as the bookkeeper and secretary for the cemetery. This last year we had to make considerable repairs and improvements to the facilities. We also had to replace and purchase some of our major equipment (new excavator, loader, dump truck). In spite of this we have been able to meet all expenses.

The parish also owns and operates a large catering facility. This facility was built in 1974. It is 40 year old facility and also requires considerable up-keep and maintenance. Since the events of September 11, 2000, the revenue of the catering business has continued to decline. The parish is addressing the important issues of this facility. This causes some amount of stress since it deters our attention to issues not related to the mission of the Church.

This opens up a great opportunity for us all to share our faith and to welcome new members. Also, this is an opportunity for Fr. Emilian to reach out to others and minister to those who are in need. We will also begin to offer a delivery service to residents for our fish fry's.

Continuation of our charitable events such as monthly charity collections, fund-raisers, and a gift card drive for the holidays. The gift cards were collected and given to our local Boy Scout troop who meets regularly in our hall. They worked with a local charity called "Ray's Kids" and presented them with the gift cards. We were able to meet with the charities organizers who informed us that the cards were distributed to local schools, where they worked with school officials to make sure they went to the

families who had the greatest need. He expressed the joy and tears that he saw when the kids were given the cards, and they were very appreciative. We will continue to work with this local charity for future events.

The third week of Lent each year, we host St. Tikhon's Seminary Choir. This is a joy for our parish. Each year we all look forward to them arriving and hosting the seminarians in parishioner's homes. This past year we were blessed to have His Grace Bishop Sabba, retired from Slavonia in Croatia in our presence and he awarded Fr. Emilian with a Palitza, and a wonderful pot luck dinner followed with lots of fellowship.

All parishioners now need to be very diligent and we need to be more aware of security i.e. locking doors when services are over, and keeping purses close by, and keeping office door locked.

Each year our Church sponsors our Something Russian festival. The festival is a celebration of faith and culture that is the climax of year long fellowship and workshop activities to prepare for the festival on the first Tuesday and Wednesday of October each year. We host an average of 3000 people to share in Ethnic foods, Balalaika and Russian Dance performances by our own orchestra and dancers as well as organized Church tours and discussions. Over the past 2 years up to 30,000 dollars in contributions to local, regional and international charities have been distributed from our proceeds.

We have Just completed phase 2 and 3 of our Church Iconography project. Mr. Ivan Rumyanstev completed frescos in the Altar and above the Iconostas that have tremendously enhanced the beauty of our temple.

Our Long range planning committee together with parish council continue to prepare for our upcoming centennial in 2017.

Outreach and Charitable Activities

Our parish sponsors a monthly hot meal which provides a hot meal to those in our community in need of food and fellowship opportunities. Our Parish has helped and supported members of the local community by providing Christmas gifts for needy families. We support the Local food bank and are looking into providing meals to School children over the weekends who may not have food at home. 10% of our Annual Festival profit is distributed to various organizations and charitable groups.

Major Challenges Faced

The major challenge for our parish is growth and finance. Our recently implemented pledge system has helped us to meet expenses and use fundraising for improvements and charity. But the economic situation surrounding our parish has caused us to loose many of our young families and college students who move away to find jobs. 

REPORT OF THE MICHIGAN DEANERY TO THE $53^{\rm rd}$ ASSEMBLY OF THE DIOCESE OF THE MIDWEST

Following a deliberate effort for more than a decade, all shared activities of the Michigan Deanery parishes are also shared with other OCA and pan-Orthodox parish communities. The four parishes in the metropolitan Detroit area (Holy Transfiguration in Livonia, Holy Trinity in Detroit, St. Mark in Rochester Hills and Ss. Peter and Paul Cathedral in Detroit) worship, outreach, celebrate and minister with others in the Council of Orthodox Christian Churches. The COCC, under the auspices of the St. John Chrysostom clergy brotherhood, is also the umbrella organization for the Orthodox Christian Women of Michigan (OCWM) and the Orthodox Detroit Outreach (ODO) which is now the FOCUS North America Center in Detroit. Deanery parish and personnel are among the leading participants in all of the collective activity.

The two western parishes (Holy Ascension in Albion and St. Demetrius in Jackson) also share their lives with other Orthodox Christian parishes from Lansing, Grand Rapids, and Battle Creek with the monastery of the Holy Dormition (Romanian OCA) in Rives Junction often being the focal point.

The Cathedral Parish of Ss. Peter and Paul in Detroit has been dealt another blow with the loss of serving priest Fr. Alexandru Partioc due to a stroke. Please join us as we pray for his recovery. Supply clergy and Sunday reader services have kept a nominal Liturgical life active for the parish. Please note, despite all of the community's difficulties, the growing outreach and ministry to Detroit's southwest side described in the Ss. Peter and Paul Cathedral parish report.

Mission outreach to the greater Kalamazoo area through the work of Fr. Evangelos Pepps from Holy Ascension in Albion is nearing its first anniversary. Please see his report in the packet.

With gratitude for his service over the past three years we bid farewell to Fr. John Wehling of Holy Transfiguration in Livonia who has taken a parish and mission station on the Diocese of the South. We also welcome Fr. Michael Butler as the new rector for the parish.

Further details are given in the parish reports.



Minneapolis Deanery Report Archpriest Paul Wesche, District Dean

Beyond the information given in the parish reports, the following are noteworthy:

St Nicholas parish in Chisholm, MN has been *de facto* closed for several years, but not *de jure*. Although a petition to close St Nicholas and to hand all assets over to the Diocese was submitted to the Diocesan bishop several years ago (2009 or so), that petition has not been acted on by the bishop because the members of St Nicholas parish did not wish to see the Church become a building used for secular purposes. In this state of ecclesiastical limbo, the Diocesan Bishop and District Dean have been discussing options with former members of St Nicholas. With their consent, the Diocese has retained the services of Morbey and Olsen Law Firm to form them into a 501(c)3 tax exempt organization. That process will be completed within the next year. At that time, the Diocese will hand the church building over to the newly formed tax exempt organization, with the stipulation that the building be used only for ecclesial purposes subject to the consent of the Diocesan Bishop and retaining the right of first refusal. By this arrangement, the Diocese is released from all legal liabilities, and St Nicholas is protected from secular use.

On other fronts in the Minneapolis Deanery, Holy Myrrhbearers in St Cloud was reconstituted last year as a chapel, attached to the altar of St Herman's in South Minneapolis. Christ the Savior mission in Anoka, MN, was closed by His Grace Bp Alexander in December. St Andrew's Chapel in Minocqua, WI was closed in June. Holy Cross mission in Chisago City, MN has petitioned to be closed as of November 1, 2014.

The need for Deanery sponsored activities in the Minneapolis deanery is significantly mitigated by a very active inter-jurisdictional Orthodox clergy association, the Minnesota Eastern Orthodox Christian Clergy Association. The purpose of MEOCCA is to manifest the unity of the Orthodox Church that transcends the current "uncanonical" division of Orthodoxy in America. Under the umbrella of MEOCCA, the summer camp program for the youth, run by clergy and laity representing all the jurisdictions in the Twin Cities area, is one of the largest in the country. A Fall and Spring catechism class, taught each week by a different priest (or deacon) from the different "MEOCCA" parishes, has been very popular and well attended since its inception 15 years ago or so. These activities and ministries, as well as others, such as MEOCCA endorsed FOCUS MN, lectures and retreats endorsed or sponsored by MEOCCA throughout the year, and Lenten Sunday Vespers served each Sunday at a different "MEOCCA" parish, have produced in the Twin Cities area a strong 'koinonia' and the sense of functioning as one jurisdiction.

Major Challenges Faced

Upon inheriting the candle business from St. John's Monastery at the end of July 2013, we had approximately six weeks to learn the business, purchase required equipment, and fulfill all the legal requirements for opening a new business in the State of Missouri.

By Our Lord's grace, we were able to do so in time to get all shipments out by the deadline in September.

We are most grateful to Mother Thecla and Mother Helena of Ss. Mary and Martha Monastery for dropping everything to teach us how to produce the candles. Never wanting to compete with their candle business, we voluntarily made a pledge to them to never knowingly sell to their customers.

Due to the high flammability of beeswax, during the following months, we had to raise funds and install a separate building as the "Candle House" so that the monastery and chapel would not be damaged if a fire were ever to occur during candle production.

Although all of this temporarily depleted most of our savings, it was most worthwhile, because this provides a predictable income for the future.

MISSIONS & PARISH DEVELOPMENT REPORT

Fr Thomas Mueller, Chair

REORGANIZATION

This department has been dormant for at least two years, stretching back to the previous administration of the Diocese and into the past year as well. I was appointed to take up this departmental chairmanship last year, and I must admit that I have not been able to focus on this until now. In order to restart the work of this department, I want to meet with all representatives from missions on Monday evening, October 6th, on the eve of the Diocesan Assembly. The time and location will be on the Assembly schedule.

The purpose of this meeting is to seek input from mission clergy and workers and from the deans. I hope that we can move to a more collaborative and less top-down model, and that we can be reinvigorated by fresh thoughts and approaches, even as we are guided by the wisdom that long experience brings.

There are several things that I see as issues to consider:

- 1) A statement of principle regarding the way in which mission efforts should be initiated and seek authorization. We need to be clear and consistent in the way we .do this in order to avoid the blowback of faltering or failing missions which perhaps should not have been authorized or planted in unlikely soil. The role of the deans in this regard is crucial.
- 2) The Parish Health Grants, which were a popular project of Joe Kormos, might be reinstated. The money is available in the budget and should be used. These grants would be available to missions and older parishes for new and creative projects. Should they also be available for critical one-time needs? The process of application could take place this fall, with awards made by the end of the year.
- 3) A new urban parish conference next summer.

We might also consider drawing up a document to acquaint new missions and chapels with the responsibilities and expectations of the respective status of each.

I look forward to working with mission representatives, with the other deans, the chancellor, and eventually our new bishop in regard to our common mission and parish development challenges.

I am very grateful to Fr. Dan Rentel, Ann-Marie Mecera, and Joe Kormos for putting on the Small Parishes conference this past summer, something which will have its own report. I regret that parish responsibilities prevented me for taking part in this event.

The diocesan Catechist and Diaconal Vocations Program has been renamed by vote of the faculty and with the approval of Bishop Alexander, as the *St. Macrina Orthodox Institute*, under the patronage of St. Macrina the Great, the sister and teacher of St. Basil the Great and St. Gregory of Nyssa.

Two big accomplishments stand out this year. Firstly, the Kansas City Program began with around 11 students, taking a sequence of courses developed and adapted in dialogue with the diocesan program, following a master class with the diocesan faculty and Bishop Alexander. Secondly, the diocesan program ran a First Annual Conference with 43 people in attendance at St. Andrew's House in Detroit. The Conference provided an opportunity for educational talks, diaconal and catechetical practica, student fellowship, faculty meetings and appointments for potential diaconal candidates to meet with the Bishop, Administrator and Institute Director to discuss moving toward petitioning for ordination. This conference helped us to build communication and accountability for vocations as well as providing very fine talks and practica. In addition present and potential students in the Detroit area met with a local instructor, Dr. Justin Jackson, to set up a Church History and Patristics course in the Detroit area. A very positive "esprit de corps" was evident among the students from all over the Diocese and from the Bulgarian Diocese. The Conference will be repeated yearly, and should be a regularly scheduled opportunity for students and instructors to gather and to meet with the diocesan hierarch in order to learn together and communicate. The Conference was so well attended, that it paid for itself.

The *St. Macrina Orthodox Institute* still needs to develop more local Deanery programs under its umbrella. Fr. Elijah is working to contact and come out to visit local deaneries to set up faculties and replicate or adapt the study curriculum from the diocese in cooperation with local instructors, or potential instructors. This is a cooperative work within the Diocese to increase accountability and build up a rigorous educational framework for those who want to work and minister within the parishes of the Diocese.

Report of the Diocesan Representatives to the Metropolitan Council

The fall meetings of the Metropolitan Council (MC) took place September 23-25 at the Roman Catholic Seminary of the Immaculate Conception (a circa 1928 complex) in Huntington, NY, about 20 minutes east of the OCA Chancery. Holding meetings here afforded a cost savings to the Church.

About 28 members of the council attended a one-day retreat on the topic of Stewardship, given by Fr. Robert Holet, a priest of the Ukrainian Orthodox Church of the USA. Fr. Robert's approach to this subject was holistic and pastoral, rooted in Orthodox patristic teachings and understanding of Holy Scripture. This was not a presentation on quick ways to "get money" out of parishioners, but an examination of the "stewardship cycle". The cycle has to do with recognizing God as the source of all gifts to us, offering them back to Him in thanksgiving and achieving communion with Him and others. Stewardship leads not to deprivation, but to the reception of even more gifts from God and spiritual growth for us. We were reminded that learning to practice stewardship is a long-term process.

His Beatitude Metropolitan Tikhon spoke about his efforts to focus on three essential areas of church life: missions and evangelism, clergy health, and the health of Church institutions: Seminaries and Monasteries. A focus group on missions and evangelism has led to the formulation of a plan for an annual Missions school. The school is designed to train seminarians, clergy, and laity in hands-on issues pertaining to missions work. It will be funded from an endowment created from a \$1M bequest that was recently received and designated for evangelization work.

Reports from Church officers and department heads were also received. We also received a report from Fr. Eric Tosi on behalf of the Pre-Conciliar Council for the 18th AAC to be held in July 2015 in Atlanta, GA. One important agenda item concerns the ratification of the OCA Statutes. The plan is for this revision to be completed so that a finished document can be posted in January 2015 on the OCA web site for review and comments by all members of the Church. We encourage you to examine the document when it is posted and offer your comments. We also hope that our new bishop, chancellor and deans will learn details about the revision and make themselves available to respond to questions.

The report of OCA treasurer Melanie Ringa included the following highlights:

The budget for 2014 lowered operating expenses by \$116K from 2013, but actual expenses are projected to come in almost \$200K under budget. This is due mainly to restructuring of Legal Counsel and saving \$92K in legal fees. The \$1.7M loan taken out to reconcile funds after the church scandal has been paid off. The computers at the Chancery have been up graded and all XP computers finally gone.

The overall operating budget for 2015 is a balanced budget. The assessments for 2015 are budgeted at \$90 per person, down from \$92 in 2014. In addition the overall census is expected to drop by 235 or 1%. The result is lower assessment revenue of about \$62K from the regional Diocese. The net result is a decrease of \$51.7K in projected operating income compared to 2014 projected operating income. The 2015 operating budget includes: \$102K for five planting grants in Annapolis MD (\$16K), Lancing, NY (\$16K), Cardiff, CA (\$22K), Tempe, AZ (\$24K), Beaufort, SC (\$24K), and \$39K for Seminary/Monastery grants.

On the whole these meetings of the MC were fruitful and positive. This is not to ignore or to minimize many issues in our Church that hinder our growth and effective witness. One issue has to do with the feeling of some in the OCA that the costs associated with functioning as an autocephalous church come

at too high a cost. But we should consider that our autocephaly is a great gift, given to us not only by the Russian Orthodox Church, but by the Lord Himself! He has entrusted us with this Church. We are the only Orthodox body in North American that is not dependent on authorities from halfway across the world, and no other Orthodox church in North America has the same vision or identity as we do. These words are not written in the spirit of proud triumphalism, but with the knowledge that we can and ought to rededicate ourselves to doing everything necessary to promote the health of our OCA. We also need to do this with the understanding that our mission is not self-preservation, but to act in cooperation with others to serve as a catalyst for the unity of all Orthodox Christians in North America. May we continue our efforts with this goal in mind and in the hope that the Lord will bless us as good and faithful stewards and servants, invited to enter into His joy.

The primary responsibilities of the Treasurer are to oversee the financial affairs of the Diocese; monitor Diocesan investments, together with the Diocesan Council and Finance Committee; oversee the distribution of funds and judiciously invest Diocesan funds; and convene and chair regular and special Finance Committee meetings. The members of the Finance Committee currently are: Fr. John Zdniak, Mr. Sam D'Fantis, Fr. Alexander Garklavs and Mr. Barry Gluntz. The Finance Committee also receives input from our Bookkeeper Phillip Sokolov and accountant Polly Walker.

Attachment A: 2013 Profit and Loss Budget vs. Actual

For 2013, based on the budget, we had projected an income from assessments of \$446,770. The actual income from assessments was \$438,622.06. The total received from assessments was \$8,147.94 less than anticipated. The total actual income from all sources was \$562,030.90 compared to \$456,202 projected, a difference of \$106,010.90. This additional income to the Diocese was greater than anticipated and was primarily due to reimbursements from Christ the Savior Church for Salaries (\$80,596.80), \$33, 912.04 from Program Income and \$8,900 from the 2013 Diocesan Assembly.

The total of all normal expenses for 2013 was \$483,198.79. This resulted in a surplus of ordinary income of \$37,550.75. Taking into consideration other income received and the interest expense on our loan, there was a net surplus of \$64,366.9.

The following is a summary of the major categories:

- Program expenses were \$17,653.77 less than budgeted, \$50,146.23 vs. \$67,800 budgeted.
- Diocesan Travel Expenses were \$15,487.78 less than budgeted, \$28,522.22 vs. \$44,040 budgeted.
- The item, Gifts: \$17,000 was listed as such for accounting purposes only, when the Diocesan vehicle was given to Bishop Matthias as part of the separation package. For accounting purposes, this was the dollar amount assigned for the vehicle even though no money was transacted.
- Diocesan Staff Expenses. Due to the way the books were set up in QuickBooks, this is not readily apparent by looking at the 2013 P&L Summary. From the 2013 Approved Budget, the total amount for Salaries, Pension, Social Security and Health Insurance was \$176,695.07. The actual amount spent was \$163,788.53 which takes into consideration the \$209,877.33 For Payroll Expenses, \$8,000 for Bishops Stipend, \$26,508 for Health Insurance minus the \$80,596.80 for the reimbursement from Christ the Savior Church. This totals \$163,788.53. So the total spent was \$12,906.54 lless than budgeted.
- Repairs and Maintenance Expenses were \$825.57 less than budgeted, \$22,764.12 vs. \$23,589.59

<u>Attachment B</u>: Summary Balance Sheet as of December 31, 2013

This balance sheet is shown in Attachment B, pages 1-2, and provides a summary of all of our assets and liabilities from January 1, 2012 to December 31, 2013.

Attachment C: 2014 Profit and Loss Budget vs. Actual: January thru June 30th, 2014

For the first six months of 2014, we had projected an income of \$219,558 from assessments. The actual Income was \$219,901.86. The amount received from assessments was \$343.86 more than anticipated. (Note, this was based on an estimated membership of 5,106 individuals, but the actual membership for this year is 5,099). An additional \$8,238.37 was received from program income and \$43,365.24 was received from Christ the Savior (CTS) as reimbursement for their Priest and Choir Director Benefit Packages for total net income of \$271,550.47 vs. a budgeted amount of \$272,106.40.

For the first six months of 2014, the total of all expenses is \$249,872.40 vs an estimate of \$262,933.40 resulting in \$9,113.00 more than anticipated.

The following is a brief summary:

Total Salaries and Wages are \$96,745.19 vs. \$89,801.24, or \$6,943.95 over budget. Total stipends paid are \$24,000 vs. \$24,000 budgeted.

Total Insurance costs were \$643.30 under budget.

Professional Fees were \$428.69 under budget.

Program Expenses were \$4,525.37 under budget.

Repairs and Maintenance were \$12,095.24 over budget. This was due to mandatory repairs (\$18,300) on the chimney and tuck pointing on Church by our insurer.

Travel expenses were \$8,694.87 under budget.

Utility expenses were \$2,657.83 over budget.

Attachment D: Summary Balance Sheet as of June 30th, 2014:

This balance sheet is shown in Attachment D, pages 1-2, and provides a summary of all of our assets and liabilities as of June 30th, 2014.

Attachment E: Diocesan Parish / Mission Development Fund Status as of August 31st, 2014:

The Mission Endowment Fund was created to provide additional funding to the Mission Department through its earnings on interest. The money is invested in both a Portfolio Fund (approximately 60%) and an Income Fund (approximately 40%) in an account with Salomon Smith Barney. We consider the Mission Endowment fund to be a long-term investment fund. As such, investment history has shown that having a mix of funds in equities and income funds provides the highest returns in the long term. Currently, the market continues to be very volatile. As of June 30th, 2014, the total in the Mission Development Fund is \$434,640.90, compared to \$413,600.28 at the start of the year. Throughout the year, you can see that monthly totals have risen and fallen quite dramatically, hitting a current fund high of \$435,833.24 at the end of August, 2014. Since we are in it for the long term, we are not looking at the short-term variations that the market will inevitably experience. To date, there have been no additional funds added to the Mission Endowment Fund. Previously, money was allocated to this fund as part of a budget line item and when parishes in the Diocese have closed, any remaining funds were placed in this account. A summary of the monthly totals as of August 31st, 2014 as well as the progress since 12/31/1999 (\$113,216.57) is shown in Attachment E.

Attachment F: 2013 Fidelity Investment Account Status as of August 31st, 2013:

We have two money market Investment Accounts with Fidelity. The Operating Fund and Maintenance Reserve Fund. The Operating Fund consists of reserve funds for either planned or unplanned expenses. Note, since the fund totals do not vary very much, the following totals are as of 8/31/2014. As of 8/31/2014, the total in this fund is \$170,657.21. These reserve funds were created as a result of both known expenditures that we wanted to plan and budget for, such as the General Operating Reserve Fund (\$12,159.17), Auto Reserve Fund (\$20,303.69), and expenses that were incurred that we may be unprepared for; Legal (\$37,000) and Special Visit Reserve Funds (\$6,000). So that we would be prepared for the future, the Legal and Special Visit Reserve Funds were established to provide a cushion in these areas should these expenses be incurred. They have been funded in the past as planned expenditures from our operating budget.

Bishop Job Memorial Fund: Currently there is \$12,177.76 held in escrow.

OCA Reserve Fund: As of 8/31/14, there is \$83,016.59 held in escrow. See further discussion on this Reserve Fund on pages 8 and 9 of this report.

The other money market account is our Maintenance Reserve Fund, Changed (Name changed from the Maintenance Endowment Reserve Fund at the 6/22/2012 Diocesan Council Meeting.) This was previously our Building Account. However, since no major building projects are planned for the future, the fund was renamed as a Maintenance Reserve Fund in order to have funds set aside for emergent, major maintenance should it become required. At the 6/22/2012 Diocesan Council Meeting, a motion was made and approved to transfer \$20,000 from the Special Visit Reserve Fund (\$26,000) to the Maintenance Reserve Fund. This transfer took place on 12/24/2012.

As of August 31st, 2014, there is a total of \$29,194.55 in this Fidelity Money Market Account. However, we were obligated to make repairs on the chimney and perform tuck pointing over the office area in the back of Christ the Savior Church by our insurer that totaled \$18,300. This money has not been transferred out of this reserve fund into the General Operating Fund bank account to date. However, if the balance in our General Operating Fund bank account is adequate at the end of the year, then this money may remain in this reserve fund and not be transferred out.

Since both of these funds are money market funds, the amount of interest earned on them is negligible. This information is also shown in the Balance Sheet in Attachment D as of 6/30/2014. A summary of the monthly totals for the Fidelity Account as of August 31st, 2014 is shown in Attachment F.

Attachment G: Proposed Budget for 2015

The proposed 2015 budget is essentially the same as the budgets for 2010 through 2015. As of April, the agreed salary compensation package for the Bishop will be ending. For the preparation of the 2015 Budget, the Finance Committee reviewed the draft budget and it was sent out to the Diocesan Council for review and comments. The budget presented reflects the current needs and supports the future needs and direction of the Diocese. At the Diocesan Council Meeting prior to this Assembly, the budget will be discussed and voted on and then presented to the delegates at the assembly.

Please see the Executive Summary on the first page of Attachment G followed by a detailed breakdown of projected income and expenses.

INCOME SUMMARY:

The 2015 budget is based on a membership total of 4,967, down from 5,106 from 2014. This is only an estimate at the writing of this report and is used for determining the estimated income for the Diocese. The actual membership number may be higher or lower.

Based on a motion at the 1995 Diocesan Assembly, the annual parish assessment for each adult shall be the current assessment plus an amount based on the previous 12 month Consumers Price Index (CPI), rounded up to the nearest dollar. Based on the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the Consumer Price Index for the year, as of July 31st, 2014, was 1.84% for All Urban Consumers, Midwest. However, based on the current economic situation and the fact that the Diocese continually strives to work within its budget, improving where required and cutting back were required, there is no proposed increase in the diocesan assessment for 2015. Therefore, the yearly assessment for 2015 will remain at \$86.00 per adult member. Please note that there has been no assessment increase since 2009. The \$86.00 assessment multiplied by the projected membership of 4,967 is \$427,162. The balance of the income is derived as follows:

\$9,250.00 is estimated to be received from the yearly Clergy Convocation. Note; the income from the Convocation is determined based on the projected expenses. It is meant to be a breakeven event.

For 2015, rather than the Diocese paying the salary of the Priest and Choir Director and then being reimbursed as for 2014, we will revert to Christ the Savior Church paying these salaries directly.

The only other income is miscellaneous and is listed s \$480.00. This additional anticipated receipt along with the assessments bring the total projected income for the year 2015 to \$436,892.00

For 2015, a \$50.00 per month or \$600 per year Stipend increase is proposed for the 6 Deans, Treasurer and Communications Director. This is the first increase for the Deans and Treasurer since stipends were first instituted in 2004 under Bishop Job.

6 Deans Stipends at \$3,600 each: \$21,600

Treasurer's Stipend: \$ 3,600

Communication Director Stipend: \$ 3,600

Late Vocations Stipend: \$ 6,000

Bishop Stipend: \$ 4,000

Bishop Health Insurance: \$ 1,600

Total Diocesan Staff Benefit Packages/Stipends = \$208,814

DIOCESAN TRAVEL:

Includes travel by the Bishop, Chancellor, Secretariat, Deans, Diocesan/Bishop's Council and Metropolitan Council Representatives. This has a budget of \$34,500.

DIOCESAN CENTER:

INSURANCE: This consists of Auto, Property / Liability, Umbrella and Workers Compensation for a total budget of \$23,502.

REPAIRS AND MAINTENANCE: Labor, \$8,000, Supplies \$4,500, Maintenance Reserve Fund \$5,000 (a budget item to be added to the Fidelity Reserve Fund due to its low balance) and Repairs and Maintenance \$12,00 for a total of \$29,500.

UTILITIES: Electric: \$7,000, Gas: \$16,000 and Water/Sewer, \$2,600 for a total budget of **\$25,600.**

Total Diocesan Center Budget is \$78,602.

DIOCESAN CHANCERY OFFICE:

This category has categories such as: advertising, bank fees, dues and subscriptions, hospitality, internet service, investment management fees, loan expense, office supplies, cleaning (Outside Contractors), postage, printing, professional fees for accounting, audit, legal, payroll preparation, the Clergy Convocation, security monitoring and telephone. \$5,000 was added to replenish the Fidelity Auto Reserve Fund as the Diocese will be purchasing a vehicle. Options for purchasing a new vehicle are still being discussed. The total budgeted is \$72,193.54.

The total of the above expenses for 2015 is \$467,909.54.

DIOCESAN LOAN INFORMATION:

The 5 year term for the original \$250,000 loan from Bank of America to cover major maintenance issues at both the residence and Christ the Savior Church was due in February of 2012. Loan renewal paperwork was submitted in December of 2011 and a new 5 year term for the loan was approved. The original interest rate for the loan was 7.1% with a 5 year balloon with monthly payments of \$1,814.81. The new 5 year term for the loan is for a starting balance of \$227,563.95 with an interest rate of 4.68%. At the end of this 5 year term, 2017, the outstanding balance will be \$189,410.57. When the time comes, we will request another extension for the terms of the loan.

LOAN INTEREST:

The interest paid on our loan in 2014 from Bank of America will be \$9,653.54.

CHRIST THE SAVIOR CHURCH INFORMATION:

As mentioned previously, the Diocese will no longer pay the Salary Packages for the Priest or Choir Director and then reimburse the Diocese. Christ the Savior will pay these costs directly.

ESCROWED FUNDS:

As you will see, what is being presented (see the last page of the budget) is a deficit budget of \$32,017.54. One of the issues has been what to do with the "OCA Escrow" account that the Diocese has instituted when the OCA started decreasing their assessments. All of these monies have been deposited into an escrow account in the Fidelity Money Market Account. By the end of the year, the projected total will be \$46,492.95 for 2013 and an estimated amount of \$60,641.37 for 2014, or a total of \$107.134.32.

What is being proposed is that we use any money that has been collected from our "OCA Escrow account" to make up any shortfall. With about \$107k in this account by the end of the year, then we will utilize this money for maybe the next 3 or 4 years to balance our budget. The benefit to the parishes is that there will be no increase in the Diocesan Assessment for another 3 or 4 years, depending on how long this money lasts. The other benefit is that the parishes will only pay the OCA what the current assessment will be. I believe now it is \$92 per person, from the original

\$105 from a few years ago. If the OCA lowers it again by \$2 or so, then the parishes would only pay that amount. It is proposed that the Diocese will no longer withhold any of these funds. So the parishes will see a net decrease in the assessments that they pay to the OCA while our Diocesan assessment stays the same. However, at the end of the 3 or 4 year period. We will most likely have to have a Diocesan Assessment increase of \$6.50 or more to balance the budget.

The only other option, that we can see now, is that we increase the Diocesan Assessment by the amount we need (\$32,107.54/4,967 individuals) = \$6,50per person for 2015 and figure out a way to return the money collected in the "OCA Escrow" account directly to the parishes. This increased assessment is based on not cutting any funding for any existing programs, just leaving everything status quo as mentioned above.

CLOSING:

Beginning in 2009 we switched to using QuickBooks. With the current system setup, Polly, Philip, Fr. John and myself have been able to remotely access the data in QuickBooks at any time from our personal computers should the need arise. Also, in addition to all of the above, Polly reviews all of the income, expenses and investments and ensures that everything is categorized properly in QuickBooks and meets standard accounting practices given our current set-up. The goal when this effort was started was to ensure that the financial condition of the Diocese would remain transparent at any time and information available when requested. This is a work in progress and we will continue to work on this making changes as required.

I would also like to thank Philip Sokolov who is not only the Secretariat of the Diocese, but also our bookkeeper and Polly Walker as our accountant. I would also like to thank the other members of the Finance Committee, our Chancellor, Fr. John Zdniak, Mr. Sam D'Fantis, Fr. Alexnder Garklavs and Mr. Barry Gluntz.who all deserve a big thanks for the extra time and effort they put in throughout the year and once again, for their valuable advice and ideas presented throughout the year. I also would like to thank Fr. Paul Gassios for his input into the budget as it was being developed. Finally, I would again like to thank my wife Karen for her patience and support during this past year.

It has been a pleasure serving the Diocese as Treasurer this past year.







Audit findings: August 18-19, 2014

The Diocesan Audit Committee performed a routine audit of the Operating Account, Checking Account, Investment Accounts and Payroll Records of the Diocese of the Midwest for the periods of July – December 2013 and January - June 2014. The audit was conducted as a select review of financial activity and presentation for the months of July and November 2013, and February and June 2014, by verifying check stubs, receipts and reports. This audit is not governed by accepted auditing standards.

Recent Audits have utilized a new process that allows forms and reports to be shared electronically. A request was made by the 2013 Audit Committee and shared with the Assembly specifying the information required for a through audit and the due date for that information.

The 2015 audit will take place in early August, 2015, as has been the practice for 5+ years.

2013 Recommendations:

- All credit card charges must be supported by receipts detailing the items purchased, date, and cost. Detailed descriptions need to be provided for all charges for which the receipt is not explicit.
 - This recommendation by the auditors has been requested for the past six audits. It is imperative that use of the Diocesan Credit Card be supported by receipts. Also, travel expenses, including who was in attendance for a meal and the business purpose of the meal, should be identified on or attached to the receipt.
- Semi-annual documentation is required for audit purposes by July 31st of the current year. This includes all reports that are submitted to the Diocesan Council for meetings, Diocesan Council Minutes (including attachments), Treasurer's Reports (including Balance Sheet, P&L) and other informational or financial documents and reports. (Addendum I)

Also, travel expenses, including who was in attendance for a business meal and the business purpose of the meal, should be identified on or attached to the receipt.
- Semi-annual documentation is required for audit purposes by July 31st of the current year. This includes all reports that are submitted to the Diocesan Council for meetings, Diocesan Council Minutes (including attachments), Treasurer's Reports (including Balance Sheet, P&L) and other informational or financial documents and reports. See attached list of required documents.
